But Hollywood's latest queen of the bosom and sand epics is Patricia Medina, a Latin from Piccadilly.

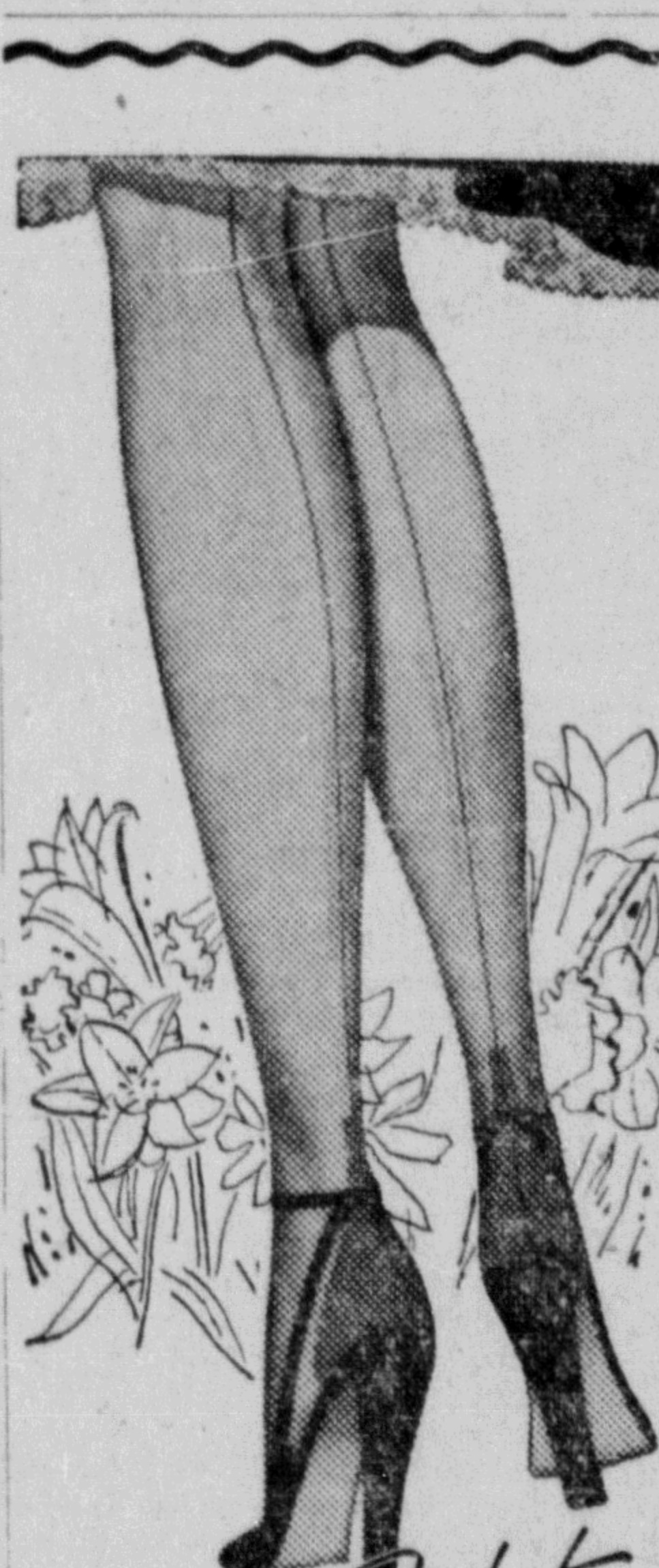

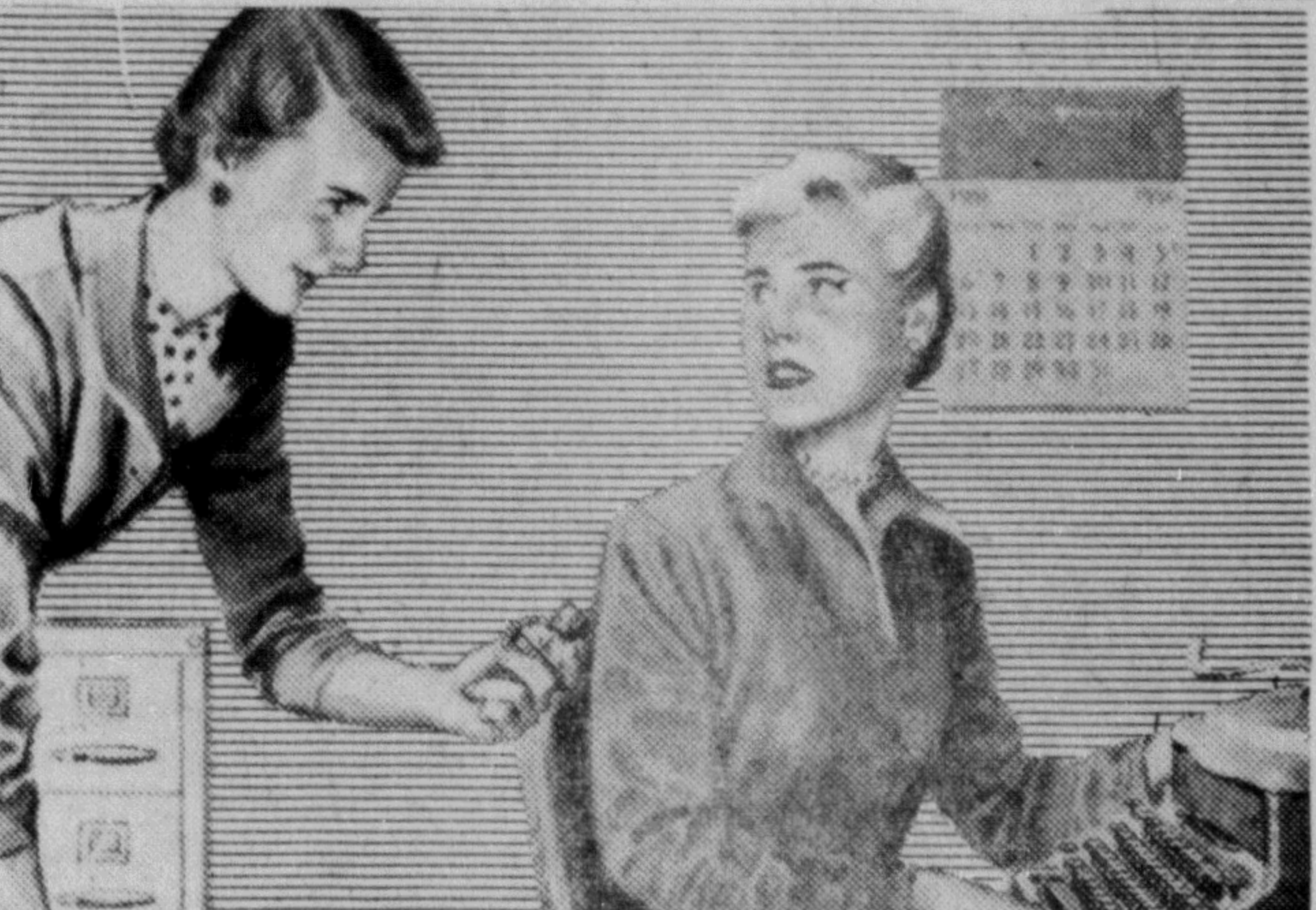
