Veterans' Disability Pensions Given Hike

OTTAWA (P-Increases in war disability pensions ranging up to 45 percent were announced in the House of Commons today by Hon. Hugues Lapointe, minister of veterans' affairs.

He informed the House of these increases: 1. Basic pension of \$94 a month for a single veteran will be boosted to \$125. 2. Allowance of \$31 to total disability pensioner's wife will

be increased to \$45, an increase of 45 percent. 3. Allowance of \$19 for first child of a married pensioner will be increased to \$20. Rates for other children, which vary, will be unchanged.

4. Widows who now receive \$75 will get \$100.
