

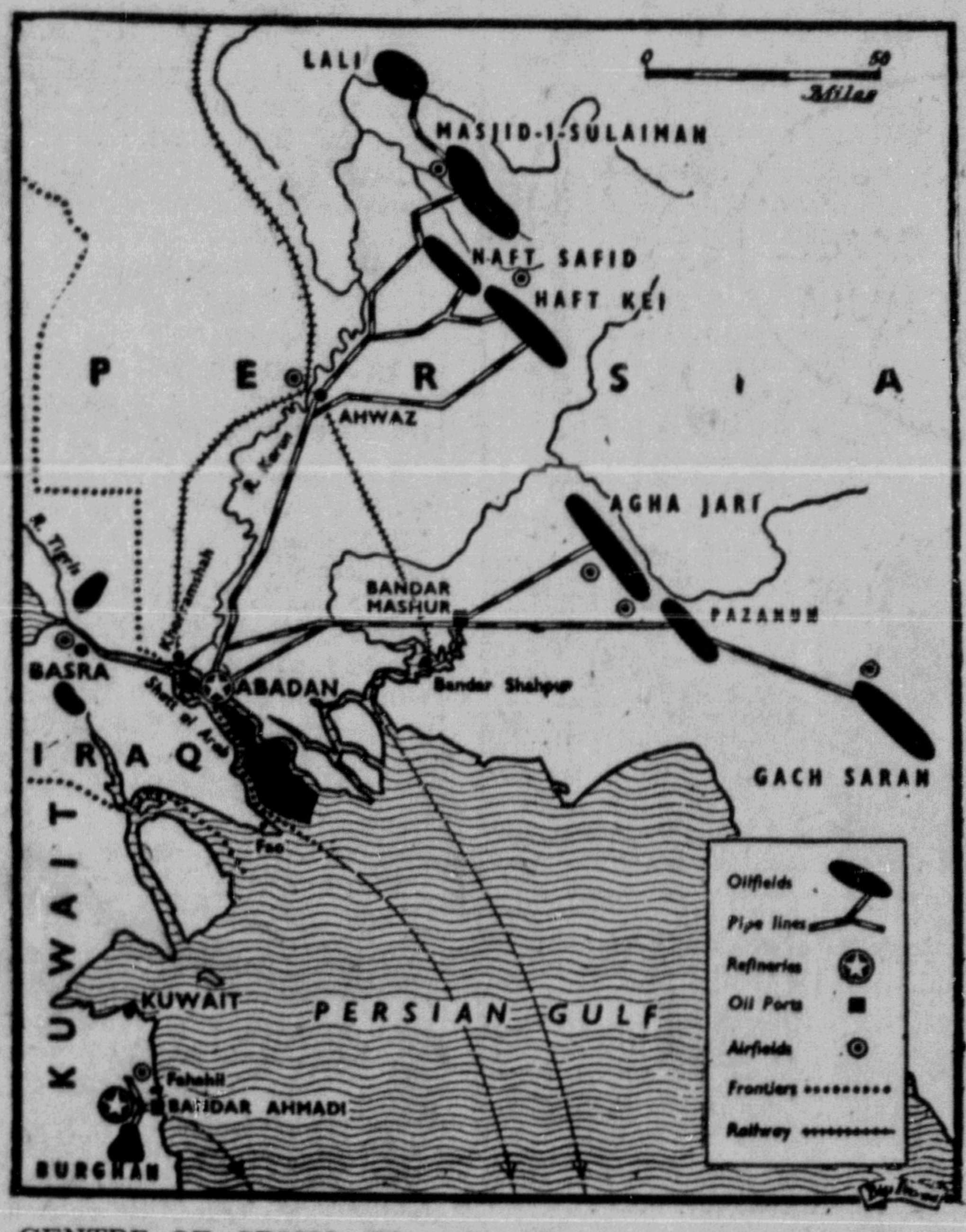

### CENTRE OF CRISIS

The oil refinery at Abadan, Iran, the largest in the world, is built on an island which forms part of the delta of the Tigris, Euphrates, and Karun rivers. The nationalization of the plant, belonging to the Anglo-Iranian Oil Co., has brought about an international crisis which threatens the peace of the world. The British have sent warships and forces to nearby Iraq. Oil production in the adjoining sheikdom of Kuwait began in 1945, and is shared equally by the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company and an independent American company. Although its 1950-51 production was only just over half that of Persia, its proven reserves rank second only to those of the U.S.

NEW YORK (CP) — The underdogs, led by the Philadelphia Athletics, threw a monkey wrench into the torrid American League pennant race Sunday. The seventh-placers jolted the runner-up Chicago White Sox 3 to 1 and 5 to 0 to dump Chicago two games back of the front-running Boston Red Sox who divided a doubleheader with the last-place St. Louis Browns. Pitchers Bob Hooper and Sam Zoldak blanked Chicago on one hit — Chico Carrasquel's third-inning single — in the nightcap.
