

CENTRE OF CRISIS-The oil refinery at Abadan, Iran, the largest in the world, is built on an island which forms part of the delta of the Tigris, Euphrates, and Karun rivers. The nationalization of the plant, belonging to the Anglo-Iranian Oil Co., has brought about an international crisis which threatens the peace of the world. The British have sent warships and forces to nearby Iraq. Oil production in the adjoining sheikdom of Kuwait began in 1945, and is shared equally by the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company and an independent American company. Although its 1950-51 production was only just over half that of Persia, 'its proven reserves rank second only to those of the U.S.

"It is much better now that we are not surrounded by guards," said Vice-Admiral C. Turner Joy, chief United Nations delegate.

"The Communists have fulfilled their agreement with respect to the neutrality of the conference site," a United Nations communique said, "in that no armed personnel is observed."

Armed Red military police were in the war-battered city. They were there by agreement reached Sunday. Some of them smiled at a second group of 20 United Nations newsmen to go into the city. Others scowled.

The negotiations themselves are being conducted in a formal atmosphere across a green-topped table in a secluded conference room."
