SHELLBROOK, SASK.—Mrs. Annie (Granny) MacTaggart—celebrated her 97th birthday here.

Relatives, friends and members of the Ladies' Aid trudged through heavy snow to congratulate the grand old lady of this town in Prince Albert district.

With a twinkle in her eye, Granny MacTaggart explains how she came to be born in a barn.

"When we arrived from England, there weren't houses enough, so a farmer turned his big barn into living places for the immigrants.

"When I was a little girl, Toronto wasn't any bigger than Prince Albert (pop. 15,000) and with gas-lit streets," Mrs. MacTaggart said.

She came West with her husband and six small children in 1828. The family left a farm in Scarborough, Ont., to make a new home in the west. Mr. MacTaggart became the first postmaster of Shellbrook.

Granny MacTaggart still is spry. She insists on spading her garden patch, splitting the kindling and getting in coal from the shed.

**Crown Jewels Tough Target**

LONDON (AP)—An ordinary crowbar could probably pry up the metal bars which guard the fabulous crown jewels in the Tower of London. But the custodians are not noticeably worried.

Ever since the audacious theft of the historic Stone of Scone from Westminster Abbey, nervous Britons wondered if the crown itself was safe.

The Tower of London however is a lot harder to crack than Westminster Abbey. The precautions against burglary are elaborate, some visible and some highly secret.

Actually there are several crowns of priceless value behind the bars in the ancient tower, and bushels of gems which would be counted a magnificent haul by any master burglar. One conservative estimate places the total value around \$50,000,000.

The royal crown itself was stolen once, but that was in 1671, when precautions weren't so scientific as they are now. The thief, the daring Col. Thomas Blood, was caught with St. Edward's crown, the one used in the coronation ceremonial, tucked into a bag just as he was about to mount his horse. He had sawed the royal sceptre in two for more convenient carriage, and had scooped up a rich assortment of jewels.

**RECEIVED PARDON**  
Blood was remarkably lucky. Stealing crowns was certainly a hanging offence in those days, but King Charles II was so impressed with Blood's audacity

that he gave him a pardon, appointed him to the royal body-guard and later gave him a pension.

But Blood couldn't do it today, say the red-coated Beefeaters who guard the tower. The man responsible for general security is the governor of the tower, Col. E. H. Karkket James, who does not talk of all the measures taken to see that the crown and jewels stay where they are.

The tower swarms with Beefeaters, the Yeomen of the Guard. Then there are soldiers stationed inside. The tower walls are up to 20 feet thick. There is an elaborate system of burglar alarms and doors swing shut and gates close on the sounding of an alert.

Nor would it be easy for intruders to steal the royal jewels. Each night at the tower there is a new password, known only to authorized persons going in. Those leaving duty never hear it. Once past the outer guard, the night staff encounters sentries every few yards. Each must have the password to get along and they cannot leave at night.

The password is communicated to only two persons outside the tower each day. One is the King, the other is the Lord Mayor of London.

In addition to the alarm system, the jewels are watched by six armed guards, whose short beats are flopped and so arranged that one pacing sentry is always in sight of at least one other. The chances that the crown will be where it should be in the morning are considered pretty good.

Tower authorities are not giving any details about the electronic system which was announced recently is being or has been installed. It was hoped that
