Fire, started by lightning, has burned 13,000,000 feet of timber and has destroyed 13 pieces of logging machinery. It covers an area of about seven miles long and three miles wide.

Evacuation is the second this week from fires raging through British Columbia forestlands. Monday night, 71 persons fled by boat from Forward Bay, on Cracroft Island, 150 miles northwest of here. One man was killed by a falling tree.
