Organizing Rifle Club

The Prince Rupert Rod and Gun Club last night heard recommended bylaws for the Rupert Rifle Club to be organized following the opening last week of the new rifle range in Civic Centre basement.

Some of the main points recommended were:

1. The club should affiliate with the Canadian Civilian Association of Marksmen, with advantages of range rules, targets, and bulletins advertising competitions. It should also register with Dominion Marksmen.
2. A supervisor should be appointed to enforce rules and regulations and to be in charge of the range at all times when shooting is carried on.
3. Safety precautions should be adhered to without exception and each member would be responsible for his right to possess and carry firearms.
4. Memberships would be open to Civic Centre and Rod and Gun Club members.

The executive was authorized to draw up the bylaws.

Follow up Trout Eggs

Further Plantings Deferred—Transplant Fresh Water Crabs

No trout eggs will be ordered by Prince Rupert's Rod and Gun Club this year, it was decided last night at the club's general meeting.

Although in the past, several hundred thousand rainbow trout eggs had been planted in streams here, results of such plantings had not been definitely determined, said W. J. "Jim" Bacon.

"I move we do not get any eggs until we know what happens to these eggs. It's a waste of valuable material."

Hatching and planting of trout eggs had been a subject of much controversy and much talk, said President Norman Christensen, Dr. Peter Larkin, Game Department biologist, would be here this summer to make investigations of the streams where the eggs had been planted and the lakes adjacent—Prudhomme and Rainbow.

"Then we will know where we stand."

Meanwhile, Corp. Ed Martin, game warden reminded the club that fresh-water crabs would be sent from Smithers to test their survival in Prudhomme lake. If the crabs survived successfully, "a lot of them" would be planted there for trout feeding, he said.

He also urged club members to get permission from his office to keep a few small trout and ship their scales, measurements of length and weight to the Vancouver Game Commission where analysis would show the age and environment of the fish.

Blackwood on Bridge

It's good to hold solid combinations of honors like ace-king-queen but it seems they don't come along often enough. When you hold broken sequences like ace-queen or king-jack, you know it is best to lead up to such combinations rather than to lead away from them.

North-South vulnerable South dealer

(Mr. Dale) S-10 5 4 H-A Q J 2 D-7 5 4 C-K 7 6

The bidding:

The number of tricks you can win from such broken sequences depends upon which opponent has the missing honor or honors. A holding of A Q J 2 in dummy opposite three small cards in your hand may win four tricks—just the same as if dummy's holding were A K Q J. It all depends upon which opponent has the king, and how the suit breaks.

The finesse is the strategic device by which you may win trick with "secondary" honors of the position if a higher honor or honors is favorable.

A finesse is not a gamble. It is an attempt to improve your chances of winning a trick. A simple finesse will win only half of the time. However, if the finesse is not taken the trick will be lost very much more often than half of the time.

I want to show you a hand which my fortunate friend Miss Brash played involving an elementary finessing situation, and in following articles I want to show you some more complicated varieties.

Miss Brash seems to have the kind of luck with which the bold are often blessed. Mrs. Keen opened the king of diamonds in today's deal and Miss Brash won with the ace.

Potentially she had five losers in the hand but she started off by leading a small heart and finessing dummy's jack which held. Then she led a low spade

and put in the jack from her hand. Next another low heart, finessing dummy's queen.

A little spade brought forth Mr. Masters' king which was killed by Miss Brash's ace. Now another heart to the ace on the board and the suit broke.

Dummy's deuce of hearts furnished a parking place for the six of diamonds in the closed hand. Miss Brash had to lose two clubs at the end but fortunate finessing gave her five-odd on the hand.
