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Social Life Of Natives

Church Club Hears of
Different Side of Native
Customs

The winter's activities of the
Presbyterian Church Men's Club
closed with a well-attended
meeting when the guest speaker,
F. E. Anfield, Indian superin-
tendent, gave an interesting ad-
dress on "Social Patterns of the
Northwest Pacific Coast Indian."

This native group, which in-
cluded the Tlingit, Tsimpsian
and Haida in the northern area,
and the Kwakwaka, Nootka and
Coast Salish in the south, dif-
ferentiated themselves from all
other native groups on the con-
tinent by reason of their ad-
herence to an aristocracy of
rank, inherited position, prop-
erty, duties and powers; the in-
stitution and practice of the
ceremonial "potlach" as a means
to power and prestige; and
third, the keeping of slaves
taken in battle or planned raids.

Mr. Anfield traced these char-
acteristics through the life pat-
tern of the Indians of these
northern areas, giving his hear-
ers an interesting word picture
of a side of Indian life little
known to the average man or
woman in Canada.

The speaker then broke down
the area into northern and
southern divisions, meeting at
Bella Bella, and described in
detail the "exogamous matri-
lineal" system of the north and
the opposite or "patrilineal" sys-
tem of the Kwakwaka, Nootka
and Coast Salish Indian of the
south.

Through story and history
record, Mr. Anfield told of the
winter ceremonials, secret so-
cieties, and their implications on
the lives of the natives right up
to modern times.

In closing, Mr. Anfield ex-
pressed the hope that Canadian
people would try to understand
the background of Indian life
and the many difficulties that
faced the native in his adjust-
ment to the announced policy
of orientation to the larger pat-
tern of Canadian living.

The speaker was thanked by
Rev. E. A. Wright, pastor of the
church.

A musical program followed
and a happy evening closed with
refreshments served by mem-
bers of the club whose guests
for the evening were their
wives and friends. Chairman of
the evening was A. E. Smith,
who introduced the guest
speaker.

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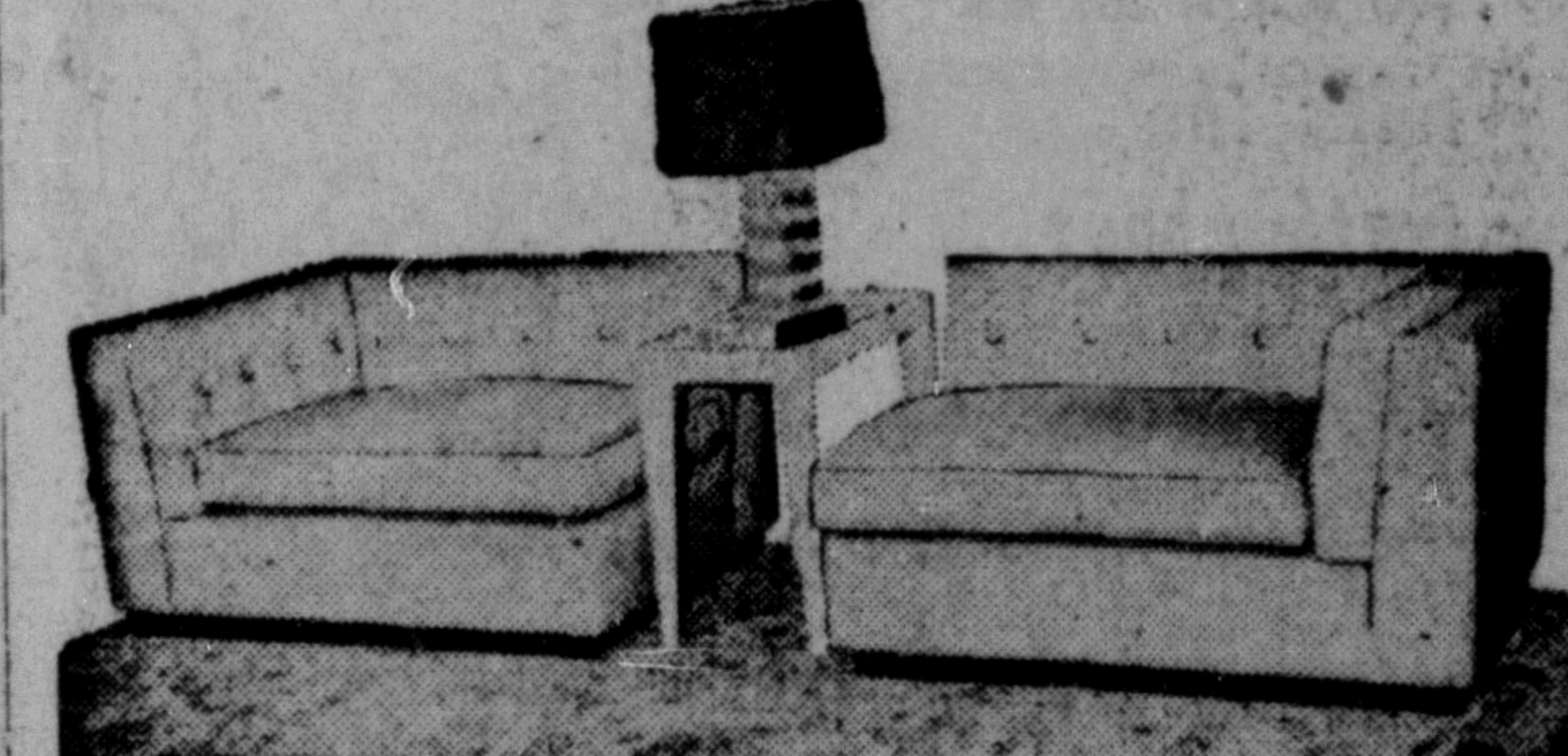
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
