

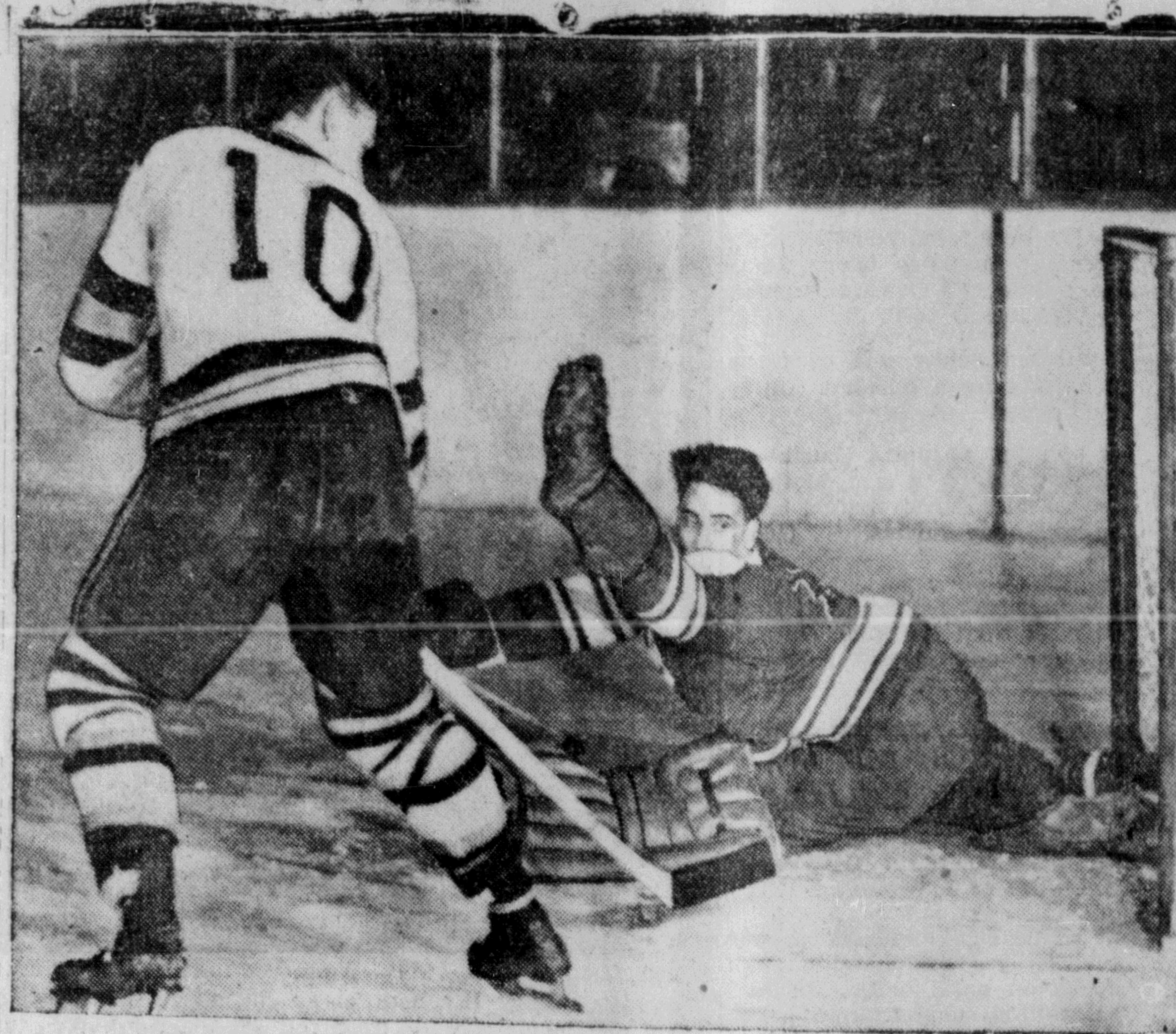

Louis Wins Over Cuban

DETROIT — Joe Louis tipped into the ring and won a unanimous ten-round decision over Ornelio Agramonte of Cuba last night. It was the fifth win in Joe's comeback drive.

The Brown Bomber switched from traditional shuffle and bored in on Agramonte to floor the dark Cuban for the count of nine in the second round. It was the first time Joe had knocked down a foe since he started his comeback.

Louis, now 36, who ruled as heavyweight champion of the world from 1937 to 1949, hopes to tackle Lee Savold next and then battle the champion, Ezzard Charles, in September. Louis weighed 208 1/4 pounds, nearly twenty pounds more than his opponent.

Fanfare Wins Derby Trial

LOUISVILLE, Kentucky — Fanfare, Calumet Farms Kentucky Derby hope, won the \$13,875 Kentucky Derby trial here. Bernwood was second and King Clover third in a field of fourteen Derby eligibles.

King Clover actually finished second but, after the race, Jockey Ken Church of Windsor, Ontario, on Bernwood claimed he had been forced to the rail by King Clover. The judges allowed the claim and moved Bernwood up to second and King Clover back to third place.

20 Immigrant Ships Coming

HALIFAX — Maintaining the steady influx of immigrants to Canada through the port of Halifax, twenty liners will arrive here between tomorrow and the end of the month. In March 18 ships brought approximately 10,000 persons and in April another 17 liners brought nearly 8,000.

The number of passengers expected to arrive here in May will exceed 10,000, reports Waldo C. Moir, district passenger agent Canadian National Railways here. To take them to all sections of Canada the CNR will operate approximately 25 boat specials from dockside as well as a large number of extra cars on regular trains.

Included in the roster of ship arrivals are the Vulcania from Naples and Genoa and the Europa from LeHavre and Plymouth, tomorrow, the Neptunia from Genoa on Sunday, Gripsholm from Gothenburg, Sweden, on Monday Anna Salen from Bremerhaven, Germany, May 10 Newfoundland from Liverpool, May 11 and the Stavangerfjord from Oslo May 12.

Other liners arriving during the month will include the Stockholm from Gothenburg and Copenhagen the Washington from Hamburg and Le Havre the Conte Biancamano, the Italia, Atlantic and the Laguardia from Naples and Genoa, the Nelly from Bremerhaven, the Georgic from Southampton, the Europa from Le Havre and Plymouth to Nova Scotia from Liverpool, the Gripsholm from Gothenburg and Bremerhaven and the Nea Hellas from Mediterranean ports.
