Judges Are  
Well Pleased

Approval Voices of Young  
Prince Rupert in Music  
and Drama

Junior musical and dramatic  
talent at the Prince Rupert and  
District Music and Drama Festi-  
val won approval on opening  
day yesterday from top flight  
adjudicating level when Burton  
Kurth, director of music in Van-  
couver schools, and Mrs. Phoebe  
Smith of the Department of  
Education at Victoria, offered  
their comments after discrimi-  
nating observation.

The adjudicators gave encour-  
aging praise where such was due  
and found plenty of occasion.  
They also offered useful critical  
comment.

That interest is keen in this  
three-day cultural event was  
evident by the fact that there  
were 57 persons in the Common  
Lounge of the Civic Centre yes-  
terday morning when eleven  
participants were heard in violin  
solos and duet and vocal solos.

In the afternoon, elocution and  
choral speaking sessions and two  
school playlets drew an audience  
of no less than 650 persons to  
the Civic Centre auditorium.  
While the afternoon session of  
the festival was going on at  
Civic Centre another audience  
was gathered in the Capitol  
Theatre as Adjudicator Kurth  
passed on the merits of twenty-  
one promising city piano stu-  
dents.

**OUTSTANDING**  
Janette Spark was adjudged  
outstanding among the violin  
soloists in the morning session  
at Civic Centre. "A fine, young  
player," observed Burton Kurth.  
Speaking of the violin group  
generally, the adjudicator found  
their level good on the whole.  
Richard Forward won high  
marks for his class.

In the violin duet of Murray  
and Robert Jensen Mr. Kurth  
found good teamwork. Speaking  
generally, he urged the import-  
ance of piano and violin get-  
together in the interests of  
teamwork and musicianship.  
Norman Lancaster of Smithers  
"stole the show" with his vocal  
solo. His voice was well pro-  
jected but the adjudicator was  
struck particularly with the lad's  
personality.

**ELOCUTION**  
The class of small elocutionists  
in the afternoon at the Civic  
Centre won the praise of Mrs.  
Phoebe Smith, dramatic critic.  
"Everyone could be heard," she  
observed. "They spoke clearly  
and well. No one was dull. Their  
presence was good." Training  
and direction was approved by  
Mrs. Smith.

The innovation of choral  
speaking, as depicted by junior  
grades of Conrad and Borden  
Street Schools, was heartily ap-  
proved by Mrs. Smith. It de-  
veloped teamwork among the  
pupils, giving confidence to the  
timid and inspiring a sense of  
moderation and co-operation  
among the overbearing.

The Twenty-Third Psalm by  
Conrad Street School was an ex-  
cellent choice rendered with a  
sympathy, blending and variety.  
"Hiding" by Borden Street School  
was singled out as outstanding  
and "A Good Word for Mice"  
was favorably mentioned.

"Bubb's Perder," a playlet by  
Kline School under di-  
rection of R. G. Moore and Jos-  
eph Goscoe, was a "delightful  
version" of an old fairy tale. The  
various aspects of its presenta-  
tion winning the hearty com-

the changes in the program  
through the last minute with-  
drawal of the Terrace Civic  
Centre Drama Club's play.

In its place were two boys'  
choirs who opened up the pro-  
gram.

The Grade 12 Boys' Choir of  
the Annunciation School, under  
their conductor, Father O. P.  
Mohan, O.M.I., was a pleasure to  
listen to and watch. Their happy  
faces as they sang the test piece  
"Jim, the Carter Lad," showed  
their own enthusiasm for the  
song. In contrast, their singing  
of "Ave Verum" was one of seri-  
ous devotion.

The 26-boy choir of the Bor-  
den Street School, under their  
conductor J. S. Wilson was  
equally appreciated as these  
boys too, evidently enjoyed what  
they were singing. Their own  
choice was "Killarney."

These two choirs were highly  
praised by Mr. Kurth who gave  
winning points to the boys of  
the Annunciation School. Their  
total for the both pieces was 170  
while the Borden School choir  
was close with a total of 167  
points.

The St. Andrew's Cathedral  
Junior Choir, under Peter Lien,  
drew high praise from Mr. Kurth

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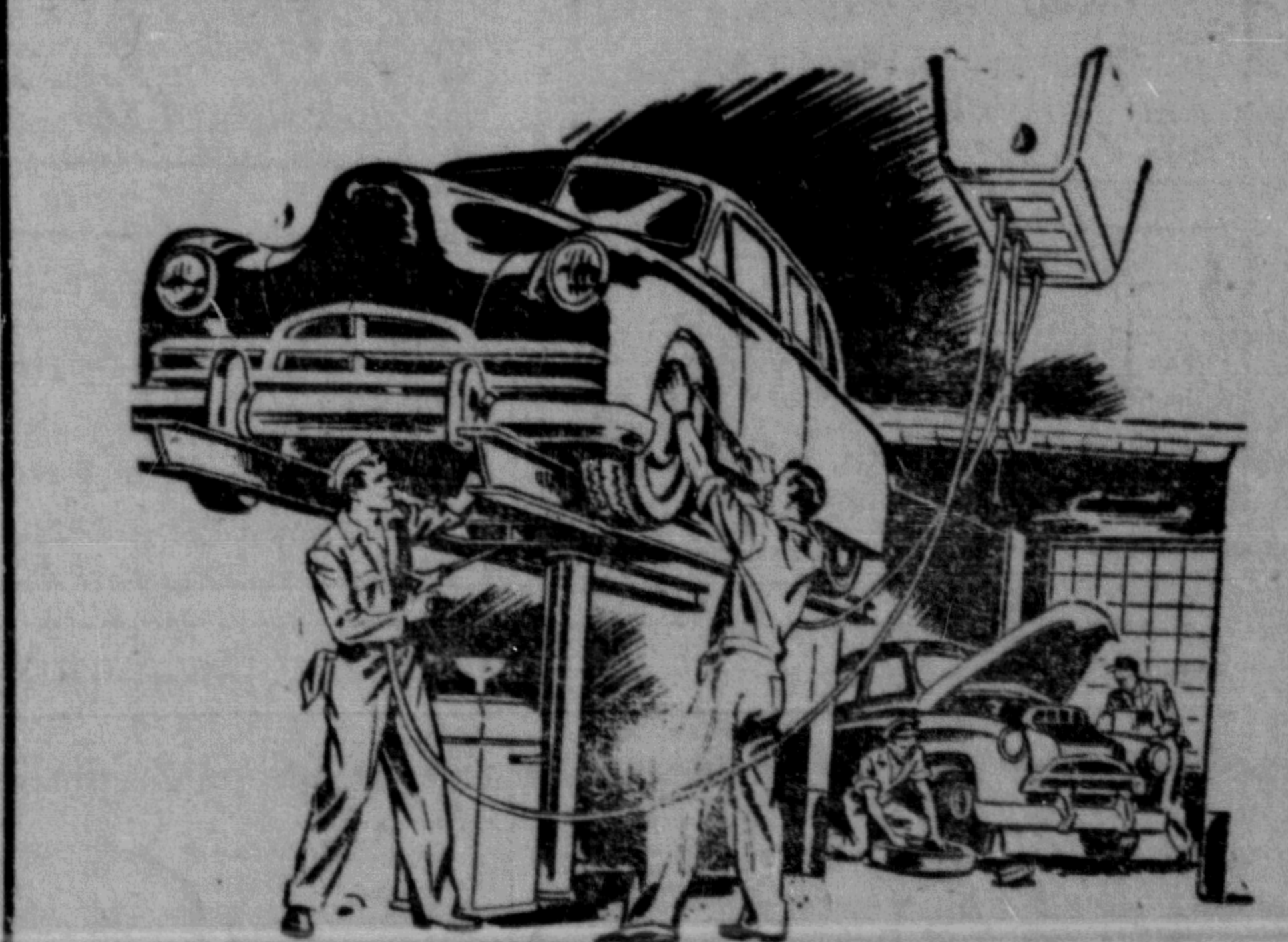
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
