# No Breaks, Co-ops Win

Intermediate Leaguer  
Bill McChesney Sets  
Scoring Record

Co-ops had all the cards stacked against them on Saturday night when they met Gordon and Anderson in the Senior League basketball fixture.

They were only able to field six players—the opposition had 10. They were without the services of Coach Angus Macphee. They lost Webster in the final half, and were faced with 10 minutes of play without a spare and then, with four minutes still to play, Syd Scherk fouled out of the game and Co-op played the next few minutes with four men against the Gordon and Anderson five.

The final result of all this

should be a report that Gordon and Anderson romped home for an easy win but, no, it was Co-op who outplayed the hardware men all the way to win by a 55 to 42 score. When Scherk left the game the Co-ops were ahead by 11 points and the crowd expected G and A to whittle the lead down in a hurry but Co-op put on their best display of the evening, outshooting their rivals 6 to 4 points while one man short.

Scherk (Don) staged a fine show of ball-handling and dribbling to run rings around the whole Gordon and Anderson team in that final four minutes and the luckless losers just couldn't do anything right.

The hardware men fumbled the ball time after time all evening and missed countless shots at the basket, only Holkestad, Flaten and Ciccone showing any proficiency. Flaten shot 14 points, and Holkestad made 12.

For the winners, Don Scherk

was again top man with 14 points and Arney got in for 13, mostly on lay-ups. Sid Scherk made 11 before leaving on five personals.

This win moves Co-op another game ahead in the league standings but Brownwoods are still within striking distance with a close race looming up for the final stretch.

On those delightful though rare occasions when your partner asks you to show your aces and you hold all four of them, the correct response is five clubs—not five no trump. In other words a five-club response to a four no trump bid shows either all of the aces or none of them.

Kitimaat Project Could Be Scuttled, Says Vancouver Sun

The Vancouver Sun says that American industrialists were trying to block the establishment of a \$500,000,000 aluminum industry in British Columbia. Lloyd Turner, business editor of the Sun, says in a front page story that the Americans are backed by one of the most powerful lobbies in recent United States history.

"They could conceivably scuttle the plans of the Aluminum Company of Canada for a plant on the Northern B.C. coast," he says. At the same time, Americans are seeking more exported electrical power from B.C. for their own aluminum plants.
