Bread and Not Cake Diet Prescribed at This Time

C of C Executive Stresses Common Defence—
B.C. Should Not Live Alone

"In this period of developing war preparedness, it should be realized that sacrifices should be made, that we should not be living on a cake diet when it should be bread, that efforts at common defence are of prime importance and that we should not be actuated too much by other forms of security."

Such was the earnest exhortation of Larry Ercoyd, British Columbia representative of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, who was the featured speaker at the dinner last night which brought to a close the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia.

"The measure of democracy is the degree to which citizens of a democracy are willing to participate in it. In the words of John Buchanan: 'We can only pay our debt to the past by putting

the future in debt to ourselves.'"

British Columbia was growing rapidly, Mr. Ercoyd observed. On the drafting boards today were plans for capital expansion equal to the capitalization of all the existing manufacturing plants in British Columbia (a billion dollars). It was all very fantastic and indicated that for some time the province would be facing abnormal times.

At the same time, Mr. Ercoyd warned against a tendency in British Columbia to become self-centred and feel apart from the

rest of Canada which, by the century's end, it was estimated might have 35,000,000 people (with a possible two million for the Vancouver area).

"Out here in British Columbia," Mr. Ercoyd exhorted, "we should not think we stand alone." He pointed to the great new developments in Quebec-Arvida, the aluminum capital, where more electrical power was used than in Montreal and Toronto combined—Ontario with 60 per cent of the capital construction of all Canada taking place within 10 miles of the centre of Toronto.

At the same time, Mr. Ercoyd stressed the importance of decentralization, the location of branch plants in British Columbia, a trend which was already being seen.

Recognizing the new prosperity of this area, Mr. Ercoyd pointed out that, in spite of the great strides forward that were being made, there would still be troublesome problems. It was there, of importance that "we stay together and carry on" in such organizations as the Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce. This, he held, was as important today as it had ever been in the past.

Tracing briefly the history of the Board of Trade movement, he commented on the general community outlook which existed today as overshadowing the straight commercial purpose for which Boards of Trade had been originally formed. Result was that the movement had gained a high standing in the eyes of the public and the government. Today the movement was a medium of the practical judgment by business on community, provincial and national affairs as a whole, the medium through which business men contributed their brains and efforts to broad affairs such as the commerce of the country, industrial development and civic affairs.

WORK TOGETHER

Vice-president T. N. Youngs of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce presided over the dinner in the auditorium of the Civic Centre in the absence of President J. C. Gilker. Mr. Youngs stressed the importance of Chambers of Commerce and Boards of Trade working together towards the fullest development of this north country which could not be stopped now in the achievement of its destiny.

William T. Burns of Smithers, new president of the Associated Boards, spoke briefly and extended congratulations to the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce on the splendid manner in which the convention had been carried out.
