The hot cups of coffee which the boys of the train crew would serve them from the sooty old pot on the unpolished caboose stove, the crackers and cheese or what-not they would dig up to go with the husky over-boiled beverage and the ancient roundbacked chairs which they shared would feel pretty comfortable and satisfying to these motorists turned refugee as they clattered and jogged homeward on the rugged old work train.

Yes, these are the days when the good old train comes into its own again and when we wonder, for all the fancy automobiles and the best of roads, what we would do about it.

It might not be all we would like, it might have its disadvantages and its shortcomings, but the railway still gets there just the same and reminds us it might be due for a hand once in a while to make up for the blasts we so often give it.


