Days," and a government grant. This question of "funds and games" came to the front when Elaine Burton, Labour member of Parliament for Coventry South, wrote a letter to the Times suggesting a sale of special stamps at post offices and where weekly soccer games are played.

Financing of the British team also proved a lively topic at the annual Sportsmen's Association dinner in London.


Francis Gentle, chairman of the Greyhound Racing Association and one of Britain's most influential sport promoters, said the British team should be underwritten, as a commercial enterprise might do. He pledged he would put up £1,000 if 29 other persons would de the same.

Gentle entertained the guests with a racy account of the recent fights between Sugar Ray Robinson and Britain's Randolph Turpin, Turpin later bashfully thanked Gentle in a speech acknowledging his selection by the association as the country No. 1 sportsman of the year.

Jack Crump, team manager of the Amateur Athletic Association and one of the world's experts on track and field said he thought the problem of financing the British Olympic team could be solved by contributions from sporting folk of two shillings or half a crown. He spoke optimistically of Britain's athletic talent and said he will be sorely disappointed if the country comes back from Helsinki empty-handed.

Cycling champion Reg Harris, runner-up to Turpin for the sportsman-of-the-year title, said he thinks the government definitely should do something about paying the team's way to Helsinki.


