

American Cars To New Zealand

AUCKLAND, N.Z., (CP) - New Zealand this year is importing cars from North America since the dollar shortage began. Cars to the value of more than \$4,000,-

000 will be brought in in 1951. Details have not been announced, but it is said the bulk of the cars will be imported for assembly in the dominion, while two makes of cheaper cars will come in ready for sale.

No licences have been granted to import other than the cheaper types, as it is desired that the maximum number of vehicles b obtained for the allocation dollar funds available.

Large numbers of applications were made to the government by private firms and individuals to import cars under the allocation. but these have been declined in favor of importing through firms normally handling the makes of cars concerned.




