Blackwood on Bridge

This is another hand from the rubber in which Mr. New and Mr. Abel are relying on their newly-acquired count method of bidding to enable them to beat the experts.

The bidding:
South 1 S Pass

Mr. New counted three points for his king of spades, five for his ace-jack of hearts, three for his king of diamonds and three for his void in clubs. A total of 14 and a compulsory opening bid.

As for Mr. Abel, he counted four points for his ace of spades, two for the queen of hearts, one for the jack of clubs and one for the doubleton diamond. This made a total of nine, enough for a simple raise to two spades.

Mr. New revalued his hand.

Since partner had raised his suit, his fifth spade was now worth one more point, raising his total count to 15. He knew Mr. Abel could not have more than 10 points or he would have made a stronger bid. Therefore he passed as apparently there was no chance for game.

Mr. Champion led the queen of diamonds and Mr. Masters won with the ace. That was all for the defenders. Mr. New ruffed the club return, took out trumps, finessed against the king of hearts and raked up a small slam.

Mr. Abel was beginning to get a little discouraged. "I don't think we should have been in six," he said, "but it seems like we should have reached a game."

Mr. Champion knows the count bidding too, and he had a suggestion. "I don't say New should have opened the bidding with a heart," he said, "but if he had, you would have reached the game easily."

"In that case Abel would have bid a spade. Now your hand, New, becomes a 17-pointer. The king of spades goes up to four points instead of three because honors in a suit bid by partner are automatically advanced one point in value. Your club void would be worth five points instead of three. With 17 points you could have jumped to three spades."

"Abel's hand," Mr. Champion continued, "would then become worth 10 points instead of nine because after his spade bid is raised he adds one point for his fifth spade. Now there is a total count of 27 points in the two hands, enough for a game bid."

"A wee bit confusing," added Mr. Champion with a wink at his partner, "when you get a different total depending on who bids the playing suit first."

But Mr. New seemed pleased with Mr. Champion's analysis. "I know what I'm going to do," he said confidently. "Whenever I have two five-card suits I'm going to bid the lower valued one first."

Mr. Champion shrugged. "I guarantee nothing," he said.
