District's Most Ambitious Music-Drama Fest Starling

Prince Rupert's fourth annual Music and Drama Festival, drawing talent for its adjudication from various parts of the district as well as hundreds of performers in the city, will get under way tomorrow. Pupils, teachers, choir leaders, accompanist, budding actors and directors, who for weeks have been prac-

tising and rehearsing will thus come to the culmination of their efforts. Their merits will be judged by two imported adjudicators—Burton Kurth, supervisor of music in the Vancouver schools, and Mrs. Phoebe Smith of Vancouver, who is identified with the drama branch of the provincial Department of Education.

Because of the exceptionally large number of entries this year, it has become necessary to arrange for morning programs, at which the children will perform, as well as two afternoon programs running simultaneously—one at the Civic Centre, which is the general headquarters of the festival, and one at the Capitol Theatre.

While the festival actually gets under way tomorrow morning and afternoon, the official opening is reserved until tomorrow evening with Inspector of Schools G. W. Graham officiating.

One of the highlights of the first night's program should be the play "When Shakespeare's Ladies Meet," presented by the Business and Professional Women's Club. It will be directed by Miss E. Holmes and those taking part will be Honora Silver-

sides as Portia, Catherine Laurie as Katherine, Mrs. Bolton as Desdemona, Elizabeth Clements as Ophelia, Elizabeth Holmes as Juliet and Christine Worsley as Cleopatra. Mary McMillan is acting as stage manager.

Also being featured on Wednesday evening are two all-boy choirs—one from the Annunciation School trained by Father Mohan, the other from Borden Street School trained by J. S. Wilson. The St. Andrews Junior Choir, directed by Peter Lien, is also contributing two songs to this program.

There will be three groups in choral speaking, two from Borden Street School and one group from Conrad Street School.

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● Scald 3 c. milk, ¼ c. granulated sugar, 1½ tbs. salt and 4 tbs. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Meanwhile, measure into a large bowl ½ c. lukewarm water, 1 tsp. granulated sugar; stir until sugar is dissolved. Sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Fast Rising Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins. THEN stir well.
Stir in 4 c. once-sifted bread flour; beat with a rotary beater until the batter is smooth. Cover and set in a warm place, free from draught. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Work in 2 c. lightly-packed finely-shredded old cheese and 5 c. (about) once-

sifted bread flour. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl and grease top of dough. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough; turn out on lightly-floured board and divide into 4 equal portions. Cover lightly with a cloth and let rest for 15 mins. Divide each portion of dough into 3 parts; knead and shape into smooth balls. Place 3 balls in each of 4 greased loaf pans (4½" x 8½"). Grease tops and sprinkle each loaf with ¼ c. shredded cheese. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 45-50 mins.

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
