When Mr. Dale's four-spade bid was passed around to him Mr. Abel could contain himself no longer—and he doubled. That was the beginning of his downfall.

Mrs. Keen led the deuce of diamonds and Mr. Dale won with the ace on the board. A quick look at the dummy told him he had to lose a trick in spades, one in diamonds and one in clubs. And Mr. Abel's double told him the heart finesse wouldn't work. What to do?

Mr. Dale made up his mind quickly. At the second trick he snapped dummy's ace of hearts on the table and followed with the seven of hearts.

Mr. Abel jumped as if someone had struck him with a knife. If declarer held the jack of hearts, the king was the play. If declarer had started with a singleton heart, then the play of the king at this point might be murder—for Mr. Abel.

He searched desperately for a clue. A look at Mr. Dale's face showed a mask of bland inno-

cence. A look at the ceiling proved equally fruitless.

A look at his own hand and dummy indicated that Mr. Dale had certainly held very high cards for his opening bid. Maybe he had bid on his distribution, including a singleton heart.

So Mr. Abel played a low heart and Mr. Dale won with the jack, completing a very cut swindle and enabling him to make his contract.

Mr. Abel should have taken one more look. He should have looked at the way Mr. Dale played the hand. Surely it was a bit unnatural. Why had the old fox gone after the heart suit before even touching trumps?

The answer was that he wanted to put that grueling decision up to Mr. Abel at the earliest possible moment—before Mr. Abel could get any kind of an accurate count on the South hand.

But wait. That sounds good but it's not a solution to Mr. Abel's problem. Mr. Dale would have made the same play—and for the same reason—if he had actually held a singleton heart.

Let's face it. Mr. Abel was fixed—but good.

Timely RECIPES

Rhubarb Surprise Pudding

1 pound fresh rhubarb
1 1/2 cups sugar
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/2 cup ready-to-eat bran
3/4 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
3/2 cups cornstarch
1/2 cup boiling water

Cut rhubarb into small pieces and place in greased baking pan. Blend one half the sugar with butter; add bran. Sift flour with baking powder and salt; add to shortening mixture alternately with milk. Mix well. Spread batter evenly over top of rhubarb. Combine the remaining sugar with cornstarch and salt; sprinkle over batter. Pour boiling water over pudding and bake in moderate oven (350° F) about 1 hour.

Yield: 6 servings (8x8 pan).

"loky jockey." He doesn't often get yard duties, he says, and likes it better on the road.

"But it's a change, although I'd like it better if it didn't rain so much."

Regulation Loads and Speed
on the Northern Trans-Provincial Highway from
GALLOWAY RAPIDS to TYEE

The Undersigned, being a person authorized by the Minister of Public Works, in writing, to exercise the powers vested in the Minister in Part II of the "Highway Act," and being of the opinion that that portion of the Northern Trans-Provincial Highway from Galloway Rapids to Tyee is liable to damage through extraordinary traffic thereon, hereby makes the following Regulation pursuant to Section 35 of the Highway Act.

The following load and speed limitations are imposed on the said highway until further notice:—

No person shall operate a vehicle over the Northern Trans-Provincial Highway from Galloway Rapids to Tyee having a maximum gross weight or loading in excess of fifty per cent of that allowed in the Regulations made pursuant to Section 36 of the "Highway Act," R.S.B.C. 1948.

The speed limit of vehicles with pneumatic tires is restricted to twenty miles per hour. Vehicles with solid tires are prohibited from using this Highway during such times as this regulation is in force.
