Blackwood on Bridge

Miss Brash is playing very fine cards lately. On this hand she made another good safety play which assured the success of her contract.

Mr. Abel opened the jack of clubs which was won on the board with the king. The king of hearts was led and Mr. Champion went right in with the ace and fired back his singleton four of diamonds. Mr. Abel won this trick with the ace of diamonds and returned the queen.

This was the crucial point of the hand. Would you play the king from dummy? That is the "natural" play. But it would cost you your contract.

Miss Brash played a small diamond from the board and let the queen hold the trick. Here was her reasoning: If Mr. Champion had at least two diamonds, and if the jack of spades could be successfully finessed, then five-odd could be made by going up with the king of diamonds. That was the pretty side of the picture.

But if Mr. Champion had a singleton diamond and the

queen of spades, then the play of the king of diamonds would bring a result of down one. Mr. Champion would ruff out the king and sit back to wait for his spade trick.

Wisely Miss Brash decided she wasn't interested in trying for five-odd. The extra trick was worth only 30 points and to try for it would seriously jeopardize the game, worth over 400 points. Neither was she interested in making three-odd, which would give her a minus score.

She figured the play of a small diamond from dummy on the second lead of that suit would practically guarantee a safe four-odd on the hand. And she was absolutely right.

After winning with the queen of diamonds, Mr. Abel led a third round of the suit. Miss Brash again played small from the board and ruffed in her hand. She then took out the remaining trumps, entered dummy with the ace of spades and led the carefully preserved king of diamonds, on which she discarded her losing spade.

Eng. Expert To Teach Here On Management

LONDON (AP)—One of the British Commonwealth's leading authorities on the science of management training, Col. Lyndall Urwick leaves for Canada August 28 for a term at the University of Toronto.

Col. Urwick has been appointed visiting professor at the Institute of Business and Administration at the University of Toronto, and will serve for the duration of the fall term. Vice-chairman of the British Institute of Management, Col. Urwick was signally honored last month when the gold medal of the International Committee of Scientific Management was presented to him at the organization's ninth annual congress in Brussels.

He was the first Briton to receive this medal, a recognition conferred on the person who in the opinion of the international committee makes the greatest contribution over a period of years toward the general field of management knowledge. Only six others have received the award since it was first presented in 1927.

Recognition of Col. Urwick came after years of distinguished service: He was chairman of the special committee which in 1947 prepared a report for the British government, leading to a national scheme of management studies used today in 70 senior technical schools in the United Kingdom.

Col. Urwick, now 60 years old, won the Military Cross in the First World War and received the C.B.E. He has written several books and many articles on scientific management and factory organization.

He has lectured widely throughout Europe and North America and for six years before the last war served as director of the International Management Institute in Geneva. More recently he led a team of specialists on a six weeks' study tour in the United States.

During his stay in Toronto Dr. Urwick will conduct seminars on administrative problems for candidates aiming at a degree of Master of Commerce. Later he will visit some of the other provinces for a series of public lectures and management personnel.

Before returning to London he will head a group at the Personnel Conference of the American Management Association in Chicago.

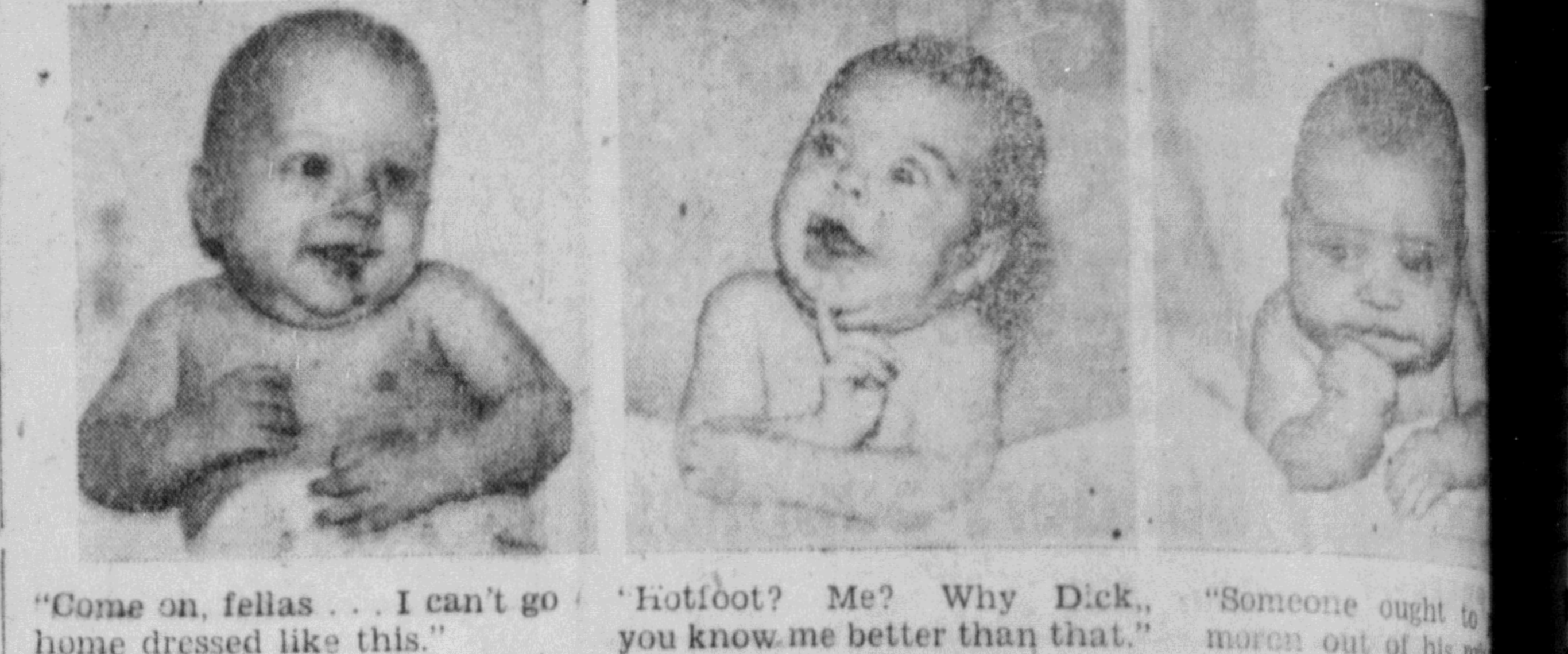
