**Cronin Babine Shipping Again**

Second car of ore shipped by Cronin-Babine Mines Ltd. to Trail Smelter carried metals having gross value of \$134.51 per ton. Net smelter value after freight and treatment charges was \$95.85 per ton. The shipment averaged 0.045 oz. gold; 28.8 oz. silver per ton; 23.5% lead; 30.0% zinc.

This is one of a series of shipments of selected ore from the Cronin mine workings, mined by previous operators, being made while preparations for milling are under way. Wrights Engineers Ltd., Vancouver, have been appointed to take charge of the design and supervision of mill installation.

**Stamp Machine At Post Office**

W. E. McLean, district Post Office supervisor, Vancouver, is taking up with the department at Ottawa a proposal of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce that an automatic stamp vending machine be set up in the local Post Office. The Chamber recently made a request along these lines in the hope that it would be one means of speeding up mail acceptance at the Post Office.

**Mrs. Hagen of Terrace Dies**

**TERRACE**—A resident of this district for over thirty years, Mrs. Wilhelmina Hagen, 72, wife of W. D. Hagen, passed away at the Outpost Hospital at 6 o'clock on Saturday morning following a lengthy illness which has kept her confined to bed for long spells at a time.

She leaves to mourn her passing, besides her husband, one son John and a granddaughter, Barbara; a sister Mrs. P. Wolfe and niece Adeline Wolf of Kamiah, Idaho, both of whom are here at the present time.

Deceased and her husband came to Terrace in 1920 and in 1924 started the mill at Vanarsdol, near Copper City. They retired in 1940. The funeral was held this morning at 10 o'clock from the Catholic Church.
