Cannery Gill Nets and Seines To Be Limited Under Rules of Government to Govern Salmon

VANCOUVER, Jan. 7.—The new policy of the provincial government with regard to restricting the number of cannery licenses to those issued in 1928 and 1929 is to continue for five years, according to the announcement made yesterday by Hon. S. L. Howe, commissioner of fisheries, at a meeting with the fishery interests.

No restrictions whatever are put on cold storage plants or on nets and seines.

It is considered here that the new regulation will have a beneficial effect on the whole industry, benefitting fishermen as well as operators.

Policy Endorsed

The policy means in affect the restriction for the next five years of licences to canneries and dry salteries already existing and which operated in 1928 and 1929.
