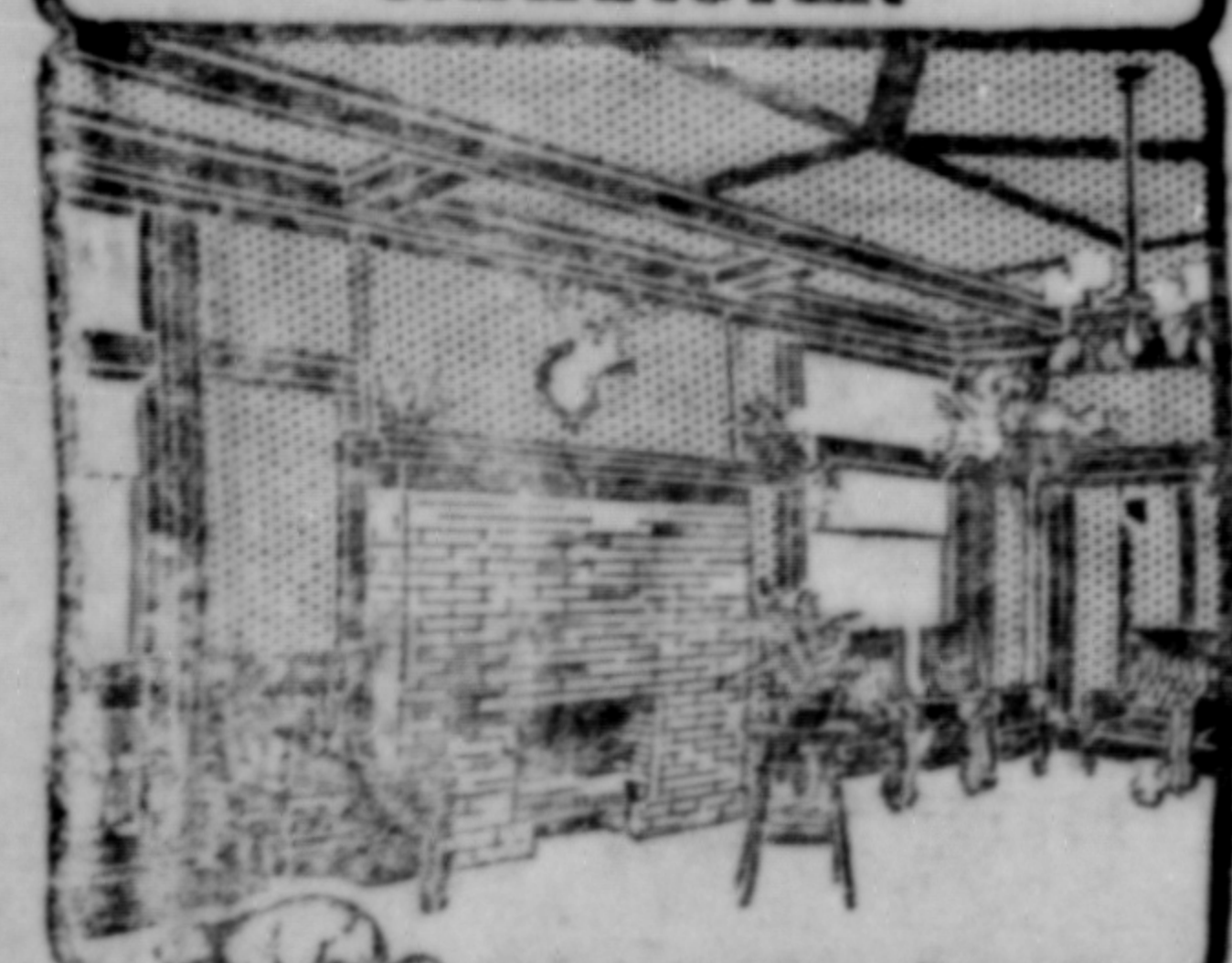

GRAVES IN SIBERIA

Those who served with the C. E. F. (Siberia) will doubtless be interested to know that, before the entire force had been evacuated, the work on the Canadian plot in the Russian Naval Cemetery, near Vladivostok, had been almost completed.

This undertaking was most satisfactorily carried out by done masons from among the Czech-Slovak troops, under the direction of Canadian Force Headquarters.

The Plot is now a thing of great beauty, of which Canada may indeed be proud.

The Central Memorial Cross, designed by Sergt. J. W. Oliver, 16th Field Co., C. E., was unveiled by Major General J. H. Elmsley, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., on Sunday, June 1st, in the presence of a large inter-Ally gathering.

A quantity of very beautiful photographs of this cemetery has lately been received from Vladivostok. Copies of these—in postcard size, or 5 x 7—may be had on application to Rev. H. McCausland, 34 Earl Street, Toronto, Ont., who acted as Senior Chaplain with the Force.

The two cast steel stem-posts for the ships under construction in the local ship-yards arrived by train from the east yesterday. These parts are very important in the construction of ships and must be laid down before the hulls can be really started.

to Rebate—New Board Takes
Charge Nov. 30.

There seemed to be some misunderstanding as to when the new directorate took over the affairs of the Association. The secretary explained that the present directorate handled the business till November 30, when with a joint meeting the present board goes out and the new one comes on.

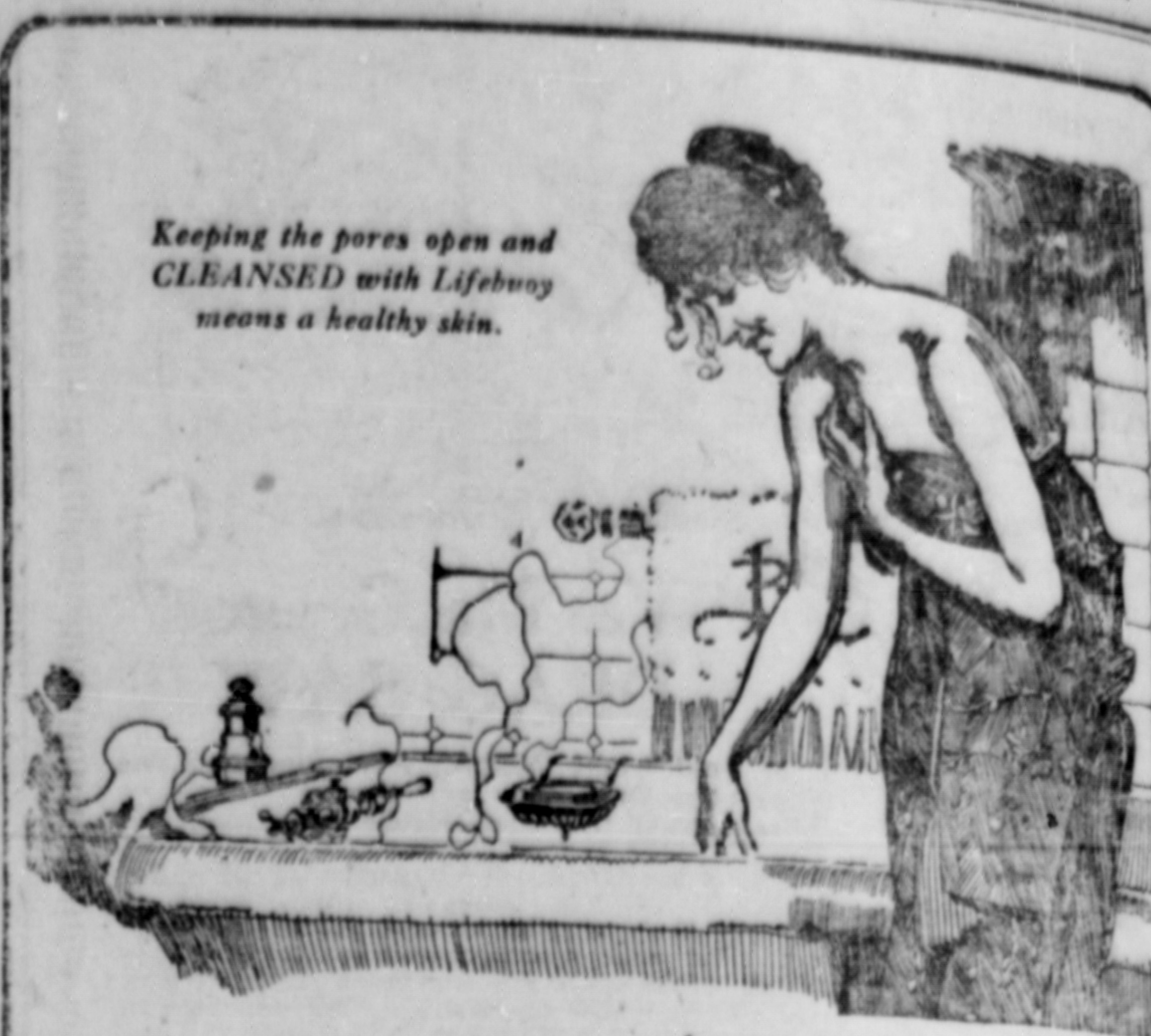
