New Chief for Canadian National S. S. On Coast

VANCOUVER, Jan. 29.—Commander A. H. M. Nicholls of London, England, arrived in the city today to assume the duty of marine superintendent, Canadian National Railways, with headquarters at Vancouver. He takes over the position formerly occupied by Capt. W. Wright, who has been appointed to a similar position in Sydney, Australia. Captain Wright sails for Sydney on the Aorangi on February 8.

This is Commander Nicholls' second visit to Vancouver and the Pacific coast but the two visits are far apart. As a young sailor he arrived in Vancouver in 1898 as a member of the crew of the sailing ship Clan Galbraith. He sailed from Greenwich along with a cargo of cement for San Diego. Later they made their way up the coast to Victoria, where they received orders to put in to the port of Vancouver. "Thirty years is a long time to look back," said Commander Nicholls on his arrival in Vancouver. "However, I will remember our boat being tied up at the old Hastings mill. There was very little development in the harbor in those days, and, as I recall it, there was an Indian reservation just across the harbor close to what is now North Vancouver. In a way the development is not entirely new, as I have kept in fairly close touch with the port expansion by government and news reports. Neither am I surprised at its existence because few ports in brilliant future as has the port of Vancouver. Before leaving the Old Country I was in close touch with the construction of the new steamships which will be placed in Canadian National coastal service this summer. They are the last word in construction, and I am sure the travelling public will be completely satisfied, as they supply every imaginable comfort."

Commander Nicholls, who has served many years in the North Atlantic and Baltic, and who has a distinguished record in the service of his country during the war, will take over his duties in Vancouver at once.
