**BRUIN HAD BIG LOAD**

Latest Bear Story From Islands Is That Animal Took Canoe Right Up a Tree

SKIDEGATE, Aug. 28.—The following is told by one of the officials of the B. C. Forest service: "Coming down a small river one day in a light Peterborough canoe, while running under a log that projected above the stream, he happened to look up and spied a very large bear. Grasping his gun, he shot Bruin who fell into the canoe back first, stone dead as the forestry man thought. He landed and endeavored to remove the bear from the boat but the animal was wedged in so tight that he went further down the stream to a neighbors to get assistance to pull the bear out of the craft.

On landing, he went to the neighbor's cabin to tell the reason for his mission. When they went down to the beach again, there was no sign either of canoe or bear. They heard a noise from up one of the trees and, looking overhead, they saw Bruin nearly up to the top of the tree with the canoe on his back.

**SCHEDULE FOR FALL**

Only One More Summer Sailing to Be Made By Canadian Pacific Boats on Alaska Route

With next Monday morning's call of the Princess Charlotte here the last on summer schedule, Alaska steamers of the British Columbia Coast Steamship Service of the Canadian Pacific Railway will take up a 10-day service for the fall.

The first fall sailing will be that of the steamer Princess Louise which will be here on the morning of Wednesday, September 10, northbound. The following Sunday the vessel will be here southbound. The 10-day service will be maintained during September and October with the Princess Louise making the first four trips and the Princess Alice the last six.

In November the steamer Princess Norah will take up a fortnightly service for the winter. The winter service will be maintained until May when a 10-day sailing list will be resumed.

The party spent one afternoon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Stevens here. They were much impressed with the tremendous size of the trees they saw and took numerous photographs of some splendid specimens.

Both Mr. Hopkinson and Mr. Clark intend to come back to the Queen Charlotte Islands next year. They say that they like Western Canada much better than the east.

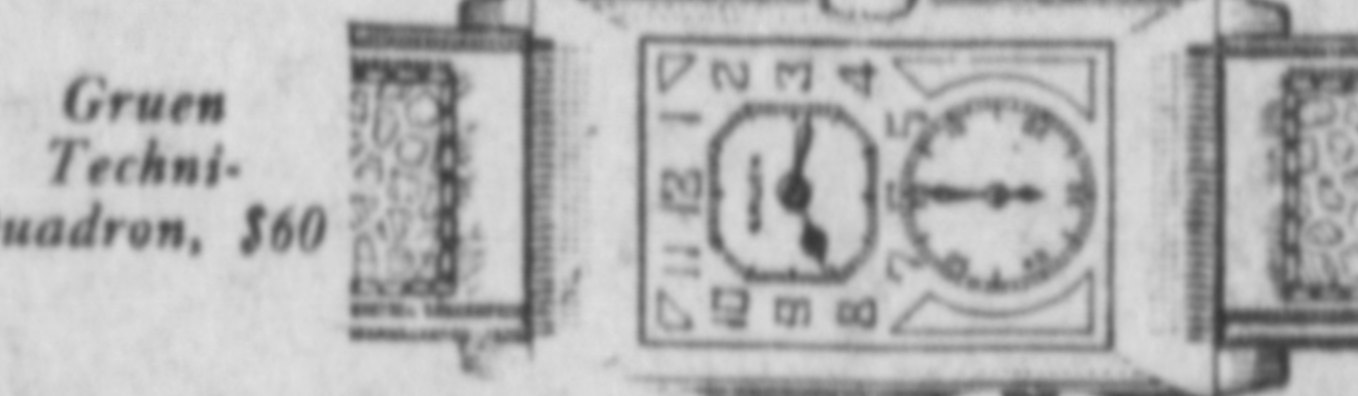
