POST MORTEM ON ATTEMPTED FISHERY REGULATIONS

Permit me please, through the name of the Northern B. C. Salmon Fishermen's Association, to pass a few vibrant comments on the now. "Defunct" Provincial Government's roposed Fishery regulations.

The whole affair has been unwholesome, and has left a deep and undesirable impression in the minds of fishermen generally.

It would be an unpardonable error on my part, to disinter the remains of Mr. Howe's child, but it is quite in order to enquire into the conception, legitimacy, and decease thereof.

I do this with no vindicative spirit, but with the sole desire to prevent a reincarnation if possi-

The Provincial Government bore it, but of a surety, it had all the features of its co-parent, the canners, and from the fishermen's point of view, it was a credit to neither. It cost all parties considerable expense, and expired "Still Born," to its everlasting credit, be it said.

There is, however, a serious aspect to the whole affair, to which I draw attention of the public at large. It has been thrown overboard, because the present Pro- vincial Government have found out that they had "No Jurisdiction" in the matter, they so diligently attempted to legislate for. The Northern B. C. Salmon Fishermen's Association deem this unpardonable, especially when we read in the press that, when the death rattle was audible, it needed the accomodating ability of the canner's counsel, to release it gracefully. During its struggle for birth, it was strong enough to jeopardize the welfare of 15,000 fishermen, and those auxiliary trades, which are dependent upon them totalling in all approximately 100,000 persons. Provincial Government Гhe stands indicted, and convicted from either of two charges. It is either culpable or inefficient. Had the fishermen not risen in strong opposition, these proposals would have been in effect notwithstanding their illegality, plus their monopolistic tendencies. Excuse for such conduct is non-existant, and a repettition would be disastrous, and as an organization, we have no hesitation in passing a
