German Flight Proves Feasibility of North Atlantic Way Authorities Believe

OTTAWA, Aug. 26:-To Canadian aviation authorities, the transatlantic flight of Capt. Von Gronau via Iceland, Greenland and Newfoundland seems to prove conclusively the feasibility of the North Atlantic air route as the one that will eventually be adopted for aerial transportation between this
