There was no fishing yesterday on the West Coast of Vancouver Island although the sockeye season has opened there officially. Fishermen at Nimpkish are holding out for 50c a fish while the canners refuse to pay more than 42 1-2 cents. Under the circumstances, the fishermen refused to put out. Negotiations are still proceeding.


