Unique Kumeleon Inlet Scene of Discovery of Non-Metallic Minerals

Ore Body Found by Resident Engineer on Brozat Property Interesting; Also Silliminate

The only known deposits of emery in British Columbia may have been found on claims of Pete Brozat of this city in Kumeleon Inlet, in Grenville Channel, some fifteen or twenty miles south of Prince Rupert. While making an examination of the property, upon which Brozat was working in sulphides for gold and silver, Dr. J. T. Mandy, resident mining engineer, noticed a peculiar rock formation of bronzitite in which were veins and streaks of emery which is a mixture of corondum and magnetite.
