



CHILD BORN INMONTREAL

Record of Barbe Le Mounier's Birth Goes Back Close to Three Hundred Years

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 26-The 282nd anniversary of the birth of the first white child in Montreal, then a fort, occurred on Nov 24. The first baby was a girl, Barbe LeMounier, and a document yellowed by age reposing in Notre Dame Church vaults tell of the event, it being the birth and baptismal certificate of Barbe. The Gazette gives the following ac-By Mohammedan count of this historic birth and baptismal certificate:

> "Written in Latin, presumably by one of the Jesuit missionaries whose order was serving the settlement in 1648, the document is so precious from the civil and his-Government has had a facimile made. The certificate says 'Anno dni. 1648 die 24 Novembre nata est puella en patre Mathurino Le-Mounier at Matre Francisca Efard Coniugibus baptizata est in periculo mortis, a Joanne Poppe Chirurgo. Eodem die Ego Joannes dequem Soctis Jesu vices agnes parochi hicu puellae coeremonias adhibui. Patrinus fiut B. Paulus chomedaj huius loci Guernator matrina Joanna Mance quae nomen barbara huic imposuit."

> "The document, E. Z. Massicott Court House archivist, says, reveal that the little girl was brought in to the world by Dr. Jean Pouppe of whom little is known. Her godparents were illustrious people, the real founders of Montreal. The godfather was Paul Chomedey de Maisonneuve, her godmother was Jeanne Mance. The exact identity of the missionary who wrote the certificate is not known, but the Superior of the Jesuits in 1648 was Rev. Georges d'Eudemarre.

"The register in which the entry is made was a special one kept by the Jesuits between 1642 and 1657, Mr. Massicotte explained. There is a sprinkling of entries before that of the first white child; they cover the births and baptisms of children of converted Indians. 
