



NATIVE SONS ARE LEADING IN BASEBALL

Displaced Elks at Top of Heap in City Baseball League By 9-6 Win Last Evening

LAMBIE HITS HOMER

Native Sons of Canada went into first place in the City Baseball League as a result of their win last evening over the Elks by a score of 9-6. There remains one more game to be played to complete the first half of the season for the Orme Cup, and that will be played on Thursday between Centrals and Native Sons. In case the Native Sons win, they will head the league for the first half. If the Centrals come out on the long end of the score, however, a three-cornered tie will result, all teams winning and losing four games. In that case a sudden death play-off will be commenced on Sunday.

Lambie was on the mound for Native Sons and allowed seven hits while he struck out eight batters. Skinner started for the Lodge Men but failed to get past the second inning when he hit two men, walked one and allowed two singles the first one hitting a rock in front of Alex Mitchell and bouncing away over his head. Alex Mitchell went into the box in the third for the losers and was touched for eight hits in the four innings he worked.

In the first inning with the score standing one to nil against him, Lambie slammed one through left field fence to drive in Bill Mitchell ahead of him. He hit safely three times in three trips to bat. Wendle made a three-bagger in the fourth. George Arseneau, for the Elks, made a two-bagger and a triple in four times up, while Alex Mitchell slammed out a brace of doubles in four times at bat. Howe and Smith both collected two singles in four times at bat.

In the sixth, Arseneau made a nice catch on Stalker's drive to left and caught Frizzell at first for a double play. George Mitchell made a nice one-handed catch of Smith's Texas Leaguer in the first inning.

Prince Rupert Athletic Club and Regiment will meet tonight in a football game which may decide the ownership of the Stuart Shield, third soccer trophy of the season. It is a match which was postponed from Monday night of this week by rain. A win, or a draw for that matter, will just about cinch the shield for the Athletics who already have two wins and no losses to their credit in the series while all the Regiment and the Canadian Legion have to show on the credit side of the standing is a draw each while the Legion has been defeated twice. A win for the Regiment tonight would keep them still in the running. If the Athletics capture this trophy everyone should be satisfied since it would give each of the three clubs in the league one trophy apiece for the season; the Regiment having taken the Gihuly Cup while the Canadian Legion captured the Dominion Day trophy. On conclusion of the Stuart Shield series, play in the league series for the Mobley Cup will commence.

Great Britain's already imposing string of records on land, air, and water will be added to at Detroit on August 28, 29, 30 and September 1, if all goes well, for on those four days, Betty Carstairs, charming young English speed-boat driver, will make a strong bid for the famous Harmsworth trophy, emblematic of the motorboat championship of the world. And according to predictions, Miss Carstairs' Estelle IV, as her present boat is known, will churn the waters of the Detroit River at a speed well around the 100-miles-an-hour mark. At present Miss Carstairs is tuning up her challenger on Lake Muskoka. Already Estelle IV has made 70 miles an hour in trials there, but the boat is good for at least 90 miles an hour, according to Miss Carstairs and A. H. Hawker, who designed the latest flyer. Estelle IV is equipped with twin motors, each rated at 900 h.p. These powerful engines will turn over at a maximum of 3,600 revolutions per minute. The challenger is the same boat with which Miss Carstairs attempted last year to lift the famous trophy.

HIAM CUP BASEBALL
