### Naval Conference Now Faces More Difficult Times in Coming Days

American Suggestion For Exact Parity Not Received With Sympathy by Britain, While France Objects To Joint Proposals

LONDON, Feb. 10.—The United States delegation to the naval disarmament conference today made known its hope of being allowed to build one new giant battleship as part of the American program of establishing parity with Great Britain. It would be of the Rodney type of 3300 tons with 16-inch guns. It is the suggestion of the United States that four of its lesser capital ships be scrapped instead of three.
