NEW BOAT

Improvements in Service Planned By Union Co., Says General Manager

Plans are under way for fleet development next year, particularly with a view to improving the northern service to Prince Rupert, Harold Brown, general manager of the Union Steamship Co., stated here this morning. Developments will likely be along the line, he said, of replacing the steamer Camosun on the Bella Coola-Ocean Falls run with the Cardena and building a new ship for the run between Vancouver and Prince Rupert via cannery points which is now carried out by the Cardena.

Extensive terminal improvements for the company at Vancouver were now nearing completion, Mr. Brown said. Opportunity has been taken in connection with the rebuilding of the dock there following the fire last summer to provide much better facilities both for the handling of passengers and freight.

Mr. Brown, who arrived in the city this morning on the Cardena will sail by the same steamer tonight on his return to Vancouver.
