### SPORT CHAT

Centrals and Sons of Canada will meet this evening in a City League baseball game which should be one of the most interesting and exciting of the present season. A win for the Hotelmen would place all three teams in the league on even footing with four wins and four losses each. A victory for the Canucks, however, would give them honors for the first half of the season and the right to meet the winners of the second half for the 1930 championship. Should the Centrals win to-night and tie up the standing, there will be two games to settle the first half winners—two teams being drawn to meet in the first game next Sunday and the winner to play the third team some time next week.

The plans for the new \$75,000 bob-run at Lake Placid, New York, are now completed. The construction of the slide will be started at once. It will be used in the next Olympic winter sports. S. Zentzyski, the eminent German engineer, has put the last and finishing strokes on the plans of what will be the fastest bob-run in the world. The slide will be 2,350 metres long (about 1½ miles). While the approximate speed at the opening of this bob-run will range round 50 miles, it will be so built that the speed limit with slight changes of the slide may reach 70 miles an hour. While all bob-sleds now in use in Canada and the U.S. have been imported from Germany and Switzerland, Mr. George T. Gilliam, drafting engineer from Syracuse, has completed plans and specifications of American built bob-sleds. More than 50 bob-sleds will be ready and in use at Lake Placid before the opening of the one hundred and eleventh Olympic winter games in 1932.

### TO MAKE NEW HOP

**Newfoundland-Holland Flight Is Latest Plan of Major Kingsford-Smith**

SANTA MARIA, Cal., July 17:—Capt. J. Patrick Saul, navigator on the recent Atlantic Ocean crossing of the plane Southern Cross, today confirmed the report that the same crew, including Major Charles Kingsford-Smith, will attempt a flight from Harbor Grace, Nfld., to Amsterdam, Holland, within two months. He said that a four-motored Fokker monoplane is being built in the east especially for the flight.

### CANADA IS CUP VICTOR

**Captured MacKinnon Trophy for Seventh Time at Bisley Camp Meet Today**

BISLEY CAMP, ENG., July 17:—Canada won the MacKinnon Challenge Cup today by fifty-one points with a score of 1076, Rhodesia was second, Scotland third and England, the defenders of the cup, fourth.

It was the seventh victory for Canada in this competition since the cup was first offered in 1891.
