Peace River Special Visits Hazelton

Half an Hour Well Spent in Showing Visitors Around

HAZELTON, July 17.—The tourists on the New Outlook Peace River special train numbering about 200 arrived in Hazelton Friday evening about 9:30. Rev. S. W. Fallis, editor of "The New Outlook," the organ of the United Church of Canada, the conductor of the party, was more than delighted with his trip west, and spoke in high terms of the great success of the venture.

Ninety per cent of the party had never been west of the Rockies, and were unstinted in their expressions of praise of what they had seen of the "Land of the Setting Sun" and ran out of adjectives and called upon Rev. E. B. Lanceley, for a fresh supply.

About thirty-five of the party were driven by car to the Hazelton Hospital. Dr. H. C. and Mrs. Winch were on hand and a number of the citizens placed their cars at the disposal of the distinguished visitors for the drive.

Miss Dorothy Fallis, daughter of the conductor of the party, was presented with a beautiful large bouquet of flowers by Rev. T. H. Wright B. A., pastor of the United Church here, on the arrival of the train.

Those remaining at the C. N. R. station were entertained in conversation by the leading citizens of the town, and were pleased with the descriptions given of the natural beauty of the locality, an of tain Rocher deBouie whose beauty cannot be surpassed anywhere on the North American continent.

It was regretted that owing to the limited time allowed for a stop-over all could not be taken to the hospital. Half an hour was not sufficient time to make the necessary trips for taking the two hundred passengers to the hospital and return to the station.

The officials of the C. N. R., Mr. Clay, assistant superintendent of Smithers and the local agent, W. Gow, were unfailing in their courtesy and attention in looking after the interests of the party during their brief stay.

Some of the leading professions were represented including professors in universities, clergymen of the city and rural churches in the east, medical men, lawyers, financiers, doctors, nurses and school teachers as well as successful farmers and their excellent wives. The ladies were in the majority and numbered two to one in the party.

Electric Lamp Renewal Plan

Frank Dibb Would Do This at Hospital in Interests of Efficiency

A proposal that new electric lamps be installed in the hospital to replace old ones so that power consumption may be reduced and at the same time greater lighting efficiency be brought about was made at last night's hospital board meeting by Frank Dibb. It was suggested that a contract for lamp renewal might be entered into. President J. H. Thompson agreed that it was cheaper in the end to use new lamps than old ones. In connection with the hospital light bill which has been running about \$300 per month, H. W. Birch, managing secretary, pointed out that electricity was also used for the operating room sterilizers, stoves and x-ray machine.

The proposal that new lamps be put in was referred to the house committee to look into.

Finnegan Case Is Discussed

Doctor Cade and Ald. Macdonald Have Difference of Opinion Over Workmen's Compensation

The case of Thomas Finnegan, whom Ald. S. D. Macdonald claimed last month had been deprived of Workmen's Compensation Board coverage before he was really fit to go back to work following an accident, was revived at last night's meeting of the hospital board. Ald. Macdonald reiterated his views of a month ago that Mr. Finnegan had not been in a fit condition to be discharged.

Dr. J. P. Cade took responsibility for having ordered Mr. Finnegan discharged and declared that patient had been quite fit to go back to work and, indeed, had received quite as much if not more treatment than the nature of the injury, a split bone, justified.

Ald. Macdonald insisted in his view that Mr. Finnegan had not really been in a condition at the time to engage in manual work. Indeed, he believed that his condition justified further hospital treatment.

Ald. Brown recalled that it had not been long ago that the board had been urging the doctors not to leave patients in the hospital after Workmen's Compensation coverage had expired.

After further discussion, the matter, which came up in connection with another subject, was allowed to drop.
