Bennett Would Convene House Commons Soon Deal With Workless

Renews His Pledge Regarding Hudson Bay Railways, Peace River Outlet, Etc.—Says Unemployment National Problem

EDMONTON, June 14:-Reiterating his stand on a proposal to call Parliament together at the earliest possible date after July 28 to present a program for the immediate relief of unemployment, Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader, last night made clear his proposals if elected to office. He mentioned his pledge to develop the St. Lawrence waterway, complete the Hudson Bay Railway, provide a Peace River outlet on the Pacific slope, increase harbor and storage facilities at the ports of the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans and the building of national highways all of which, he said, were works from which the nation as a whole would benefit. Mr. Bennett declared that unemployment had now become a national matter.
