The city council last night adopted a recommendation from the Board of Works to refund to Edward Lipsett (Prince Rupert) Ltd. a sum of \$275 in connection with overpayment made by that company to the city a few years ago when a water connection was laid down to serve various business establishments on that part of the waterfront. It was explained that the company had paid considerably more than its share under the scheme whereby the city was to pay half the cost of the connection and the consumers the other half.

The city council last night finally reconsidered and adopted the bylaw setting the tax rate for the year at 48 mills.

A letter from H. L. Taylor, inspector of electrical energy, inquiring if the city had any objection, through conflict with the telephone system or for any other reason, to the route which was to be followed by the Northern B.C. Power Co. with its power transmission line to Galloway Rapids approved by the federal parliament in 1929 and most of the lines are located in Saskatchewan and Alberta. Canadian National to Expend \$25,000,000 In West In 1930; Hudson Bay Road to Churchill

WINNIPEG, April 1.—The Canadian National Railways will spend \$25,000,000 on new construction, maintenance and general betterment work in Western Canada this year, according to a statement issued today by A. E. Warren, vice-president of the western region of the company. This figure is exclusive of the sums which will be spent on the Hudson Bay Railway, and it does not include the Canadian National's share of the budget for the Northern Alberta Railways.

As has already been announced, \$9,000,000 will be used in the branch line building program. This work is part of this portion of the three year program approved by the federal parliament in 1929 and most of the lines are located in Saskatchewan and Alberta. Two are being built in British Columbia. Altogether 12 branch lines are included in this year's western program. The balance of the money will be used on lines in the west now in the operation and on the two hotels which are under construction in Vancouver and Saskatoon. Relaying of steel, track maintenance and improvement, ballasting, track extensions, bridging, fencing, the erecting of new buildings, water supplies and railroad facilities generally comprise the bulk of the work for which provision has been made. It is not possible at this time to particularize the various items in the budget since each item requiring a capital outlay has to be sanctioned by parliament before work can be commenced.

It can be said, however, that among other things, the company proposes to replace 270 miles of 80 and 85 pound steel with new 100 pound steel and to relay 100 miles of light track with 80 and 85 pound steel. In the program for further strengthening track structure the installation of some 2,725,000 tie plates and 680,000 rail anchors is contemplated. Between three and a half and four million ties will be replaced. Of this number about 15% will be treated ties. A considerable amount of ballasting is also proposed.

Big Program
The extension of 40 passing tracks on trunk lines is proposed. This increased capacity will permit a more economical use of the power. Provision is made for the construction of through sidings at 31 points in addition to existing sidings.

Hudson Bay Road
It is expected that the progress to be made during this year on the various works will be sufficient to complete and equip the Hudson Bay Railway to a point which will permit of commercial business being extended beyond Mile 356 to Churchill. This, however, will depend to a considerable extent upon how early weather conditions will allow work to be resumed.
