Canada Mineral Wealth Might Be Used To Pay Empire National Debt

Local Member Mxes Glowing Speech to Service Club; Cost o Transportation Now Bar

OTTAWA, Apri :- Declaring that the future greatness of the Dominia lies in the wealth of her mines, James C. Brady, M.P. for keena, addressing an Ottawa service club, asserted that te day would come when wealth would be taken from strems and creeks of the Rocky Mountains not merely today the national debt of Canada but would go far in reduing the national debt of the Empire. He said that he mad his prediction in the face of the fact that hundreds of milions dollars of wealth had already been taken from the round in British Columbia. The high cost of transportation, he said, constituted a barrier at present to more rand mining developments in British Columbia.

REIGNOF TERROR ON

Bandit Armies South of the Yangste River Perpetrate Atrocities Upon Christians

SHANGHAI, April 1:-Dispatches received today confirmed scattered reports that bandit armies were conducting a virtual reign of terror in several provinces of China south of the Yangste River.

From Hankow came information that the bandits who on Thursday looted the city of Yanchow in Western Kiangsi Province, besides capturing three missionaries, had boiled a district magistrate in oil and murdered a Chinese Christian pastor. Grave fears are felt for the kidnapped trio which includes Miss Nina Gemmel, formerly of Tacoma, Washington.

Canada Maintains Right to Use All Channels of Broadcasting Marine Minister Tells House

Fifty Thousand More Collected on Imports Than Previous Year

Total For Fiscal Period Just Past, \$315,729.03 as Against \$262,014.18 in Preceding Twelve Months

Customs and excise collections at the port of Prince Rupert for the fiscal year ending March 31 totalling \$315,-729.03 as compared with \$262,014.18 in the fiscal year immediately preceding or an increase of \$53,714.85, it was announced this morning by J. H. McLeod, collector of customs. There was an increase of \$70,062.52 in import duties and an increase of \$158.69 in sundry collections while excise tax collections showed a decrease of \$16,506.36 due to statutory reductions in various forms of federal taxa-
