

NELSON DAY NAVY LEAGUE

Big Drive Commands Interest and Support of Every Canadian.

Ships and men to man them are the big need of the Empire today. Canada is called upon to do her share in meeting the necessity. Shipyards are busy and new boats are being turned out as quickly as possible to fill the great gaps made in the merchant marine service through the dastardly work of the Hun submarines during the bitter years of the war. Ships and more ships mean much to Canada, for this nation must have a great export trade for its surplus products if prosperity is to become permanent. Qualified sailors in great number will be required to man these ships. Canada must provide as many of these men as possible, and must have them ready as the ships are ready. To this end the Navy League of Canada is doing wonderful work through the medium of its naval brigades. For the continuance and extension of this valuable mission and for the establishment and maintenance of sailors' homes in Canadian ports the League is now calling upon the citizens of the Dominion to subscribe half a million dollars. That is the object of the Nelson Day campaign which is to be short and sharp. The actual drive will last for three days, October 21, 22, 23, and the duty devolves upon every Canadian to make it a success.

NAAS SETTLERS ASK FOR HELP

Tax Payers of That District Request That Privileges be Extended to Them.

Aiyansh, Oct. 20.—At a meeting of the settlers of the Naas valley held here on September 27 the following resolution was passed:

"That this meeting requests the Dominion Government to make the Naas River Canyon navigable and to furnish wharfage facilities at the mouth of the river, preferably at Mill Bay." It was pointed out in this connection that an appropriation had already been made for this purpose and what they wanted was to get the work done.

Another resolution read: "That this meeting requests the Provincial Government to put on a fifty-ton stern wheel river boat to ply as far as Grace Harbor." This would for the present solve the transportation problem so far as the river is concerned.

The third resolution was: "That this meeting requests the establishment of a community settlement from the Tseax River to the sixteen mile post up the Grease Trail wagon road; and that an appropriation of \$25,000 for roads be asked for next year."

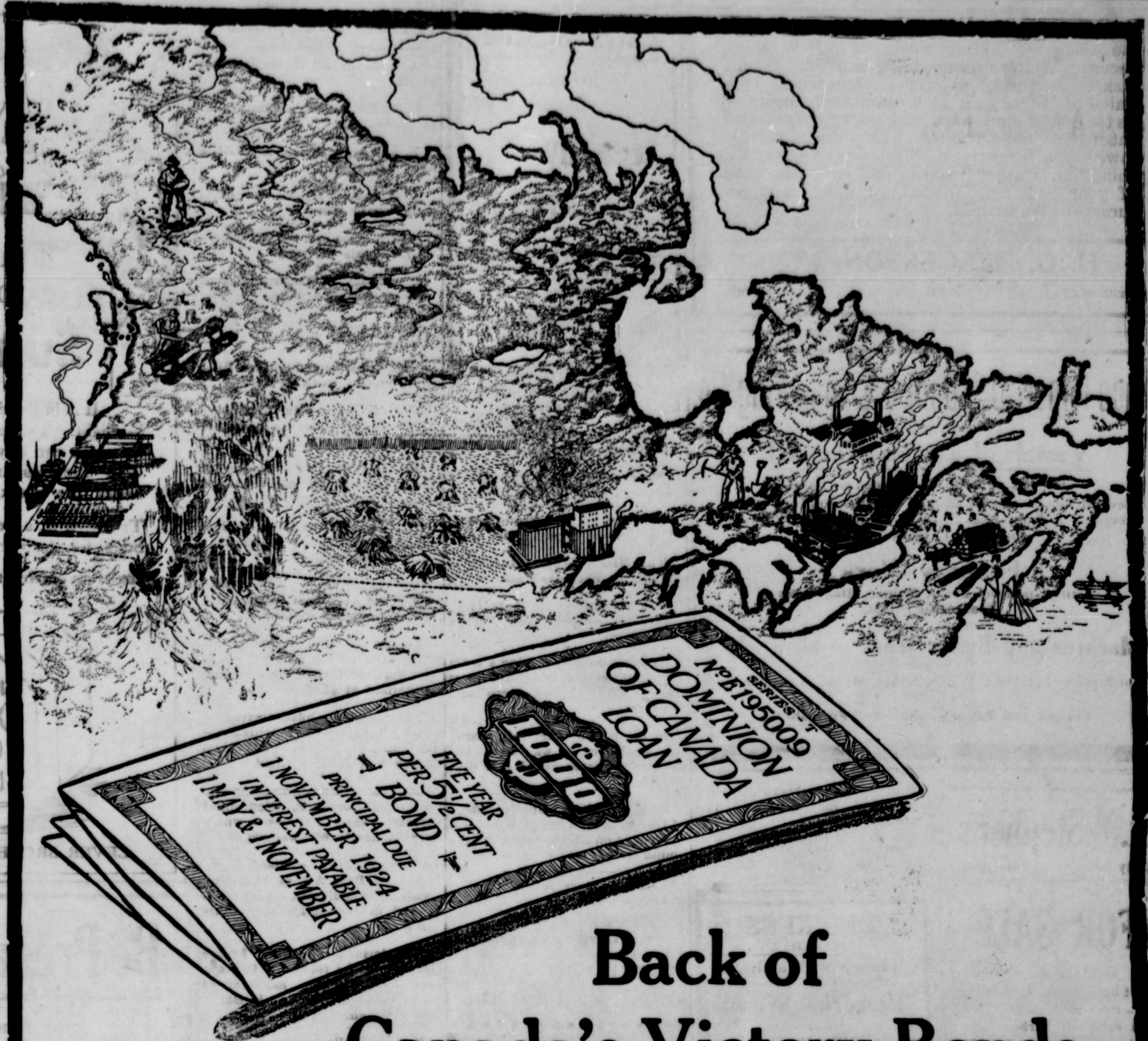
1,600 TRIBUNALS ARE PROBING PROFITEERING
