# MAY AVERT A GENERAL COAL STRIKE

## NEW POWER DEVELOPMENT HERE IS OFFICIALLY OPENED

### Scottish Dispute Is Still Unsettled But Walk Out in Other Fields May Not ensue It Is Now Believed

#### Conciliation Board Adjourns Today After Meeting With No Success In Deliberations Between Owners and Workers—Trouble May Not Last Long

GLASGOW, Scotland, Dec. 1:—The conciliation board, which met today in an effort to effect an adjustment between Scottish mine owners and coal miners who have quit work, adjourned this afternoon without a settlement being reached. Ninety thousand Scottish miners failed to show up at the pits today. Despite the situation in the

Scottish coalfields, British authorities today had hope that a nationwide general coalfields strike at first threatened for today would be averted. Unless a nation-wide strike develops, it is not believed that the Scottish miners will stay out long.

### BISHOP RIX HIT BY CAR

#### Is In Hospital Suffering From Broken Rib and Shock; On Way to Church

Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia, is a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital suffering from a broken rib and shock as a result of being struck down by an automobile at 7:25 last evening as he was proceeding to evening service at St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral. William White was the driver of the car—a taxi—which struck the bishop. The car had just turned off McBride Street and was proceeding east along Sixth Avenue. The bishop was walking in the opposite direction.

White will be charged in city police court with driving to the common danger. Bishop Rix was resting as comfortably as could be expected, it was reported today.

### ESSINGTON OLD TIMER

#### William Holland, Who Died at Week-End, Had Lived on Skeena River For 27 Years

William Holland, aged 54, who had been a cannery employee at Port Essington for 27 years, died at 10 o'clock Saturday night in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for some time. The late Mr. Holland, who was born in Cheshire, England, is survived by a widow at Port Essington. He was well known in this city.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon with Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook officiating.

### POLICE COURT FINES LOWER

During the month of November this year police court fines totalled \$430 as against \$565 in the same month last year. So far this year, fines have aggregated \$9,490.50 as against \$6,698 in the first 11 months of 1929.

### WEATHER IMPROVED

#### Less Rain and More Sun In Prince Rupert This Year Than Last

Believe it or not! Rainfall in Prince Rupert during the month of November this year, totalling 7.31 inches, was less than half of the 15.73 inches which fell in the same month last year. To date this year, there has been an aggregate of 69.85 inches of precipitation recorded as against 73.83 inches during the first 11 months of 1929.

Sunshine this year, totalling 1,194.74 hours to date is maintaining a slight lead over the first 11 months of 1929, the total for which was 1189 hours. In November this year there was a total of 34.4 hours of sunshine as compared with 52.5 hours in November, 1929.

E. B. Walker, chief electrical engineer of the Canadian National Railways, arrived on Sunday's train on official business. Mr. Walker, accompanied by his wife, intends to remain in the city until Wednesday when they will leave on the Prince George for Anyox and Stewart, then south to Vancouver and back to Toronto for the holidays.

Mr. Walker is the son of the late Sir Edmund Walker president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. He is a cousin of Mrs. J. E. Boullione, whose husband is in the service of the Power Corporation of Canada here.

### Important Episode In Development of City Is Being Carried Out

#### Mayor C. H. Orme Officially Switches On New Electrical Energy Which Is Expected to Mean a Great Deal to Prince Rupert

An event of outstanding importance in the history and development of Prince Rupert is being enacted today at Falls River where Mayor C. H. Orme is this afternoon officially turning on the new power development of the Power Corporation of Canada. It is anticipated that it will be the first step in an era of industrial expansion which

the city has long hoped for but which has been delayed through lack of adequate power development. The ceremony is being witnessed by a large party of leading citizens of Prince Rupert including Mayor C. H. Orme, members of the city council and Chamber of Commerce and leaders in the business and professional life of the city. The party left here at 9 o'clock this morning on a special train for Haysport whence they proceeded by gasboats across the Skeena River and up the Ecstall River to Falls River. Following the tendering of a luncheon to the visitors the official switching on of the new power took place. The party is due to return to the city at 7:30 this evening and the switching on of the new ornamental street lighting system will then take place with Mrs. C. H. Orme, wife of the mayor, officiating.

H. E. Pawson, assistant commercial manager of the Power Corporation of Canada, is representing the parent company at the official opening proceedings. This afternoon, Mrs. J. J. Little, wife of the general manager of the Northern British Columbia Power Co., is entertaining at an afternoon tea to mark socially the official opening of the new power development. This evening, a dance is being given by the Moose Lodge to celebrate the occasion. Full reports of the power opening proceedings will be given tomorrow in a special 18-page issue of the Daily News which will also include many special articles with profuse illustrations as well as the ordinary news features of the day.

Alfred C. Flumerfelt, long prominent in affairs of Province, Succumbs to Peritonitis

VICTORIA, Dec. 1:—Alfred C. Flumerfelt, Victoria capitalist, president of the Pacific Coast Terminal Co. and director of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co., died Saturday evening from peritonitis. He was 74 years of age and was born in Markham, Ont.

The funeral will be held on Tuesday.

### REVENUE IS DOWN

#### Customs and Excise Collections Continue Decrease From Last Year—Last Month Light

Customs and excise collections at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of November this year fell off to \$6,808.95 as against \$27,896.03 in the same month of 1929. So far this year revenue from this source has amounted to but \$186,654.92 as compared with \$279,278.01 in the first 11 months of 1929.

### TO HELP FARMERS

#### Seed Cleaning and Dairy Demon- stration Car to Tour Saskatchewan

WINNIPEG, Dec. 1:—The Saskatchewan field crops branch and dairy branch of the Department of Agriculture, co-operating with the Canadian National Railways, will operate a seed cleaning and dairy demonstration movement over Canadian National lines in Saskatchewan commencing today and closing January 30. The train consists of two demonstration cars, one lecture coach and a staff car and will operate for the entire two months with the exception of 10 days during the Christmas season. It is the intention of the field crops branch to demonstrate, at some 45 points of call, seed cleaning machinery of various types, showing results which are to be obtained from these efficient aids in the preparation of grain for seed and commercial purposes. Special emphasis will be given to the preparation of exhibit material for the seed grain shows, this feature being of vital importance at this time in view of the approaching World's Grain Show at Regina in 1932.

The Dominion seed branch is co-operating and a representative of that body will accompany the train to discuss seed grades. The dairy branch, under the direction of Percy Reed, dairy commissioner for Saskatchewan, will have a special section devoted to the interests of the industry dealing with the production and marketing of dairy products.

### LANDED IN VANCOUVER

#### Phinney and Dunlap Return Safely to Jericho Beach Air Base

VANCOUVER, Dec. 1:—Flight Lieutenant Phinney and Flying Officer Dunlap landed here Saturday afternoon after an absence of three weeks conducting a search out of Prince Rupert for Pilot Robin Renahan, missing commercial aviator, and two companions. They had spent Friday night at Comox, being unable to come in here on account of fog. Their planes are to be equipped for winter flying in the event of being dispatched to Atlin in aid in the search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke and his companions.
