15 DISCUSSED

Several Interesting Matters Trades & Labor Meeting: Labor Party Mooted

A resolution from the Winnipeg Trades & Labor Council in the matter of immigration and unemployment formed one of the principal items of business at the monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades & Labor Council last night with Ald. S. D. Macdonald, president, in the chair. The matter was referred to the legislative committee with the request that a rcommendation be made for the council to act upon. A number of delegates expressed their views on the matter and criticized the present policy of the government in regard to unemployment.

Another important matter of discussion was with regard to the proposal to form a Labor Party here. A special standing committee was named to obtain data on the matter with a view to having Labor take a more active part in both or either the provincial or

The question came up as to whether it was legal to import labor from one province to another. The president stated that this could only be done with the express permission of the general superintendent for the Employment Service of Canada in the province concer-

A letter from the Sheet Metal Workers' Union stated that Ratchford & Shenton and H. Letourneau were the only shops in the city working men on a union basis.

A letter from the Toronto Metal Polishers' Union with regard to a strike was read and left in the hands of the executive for action. Objection is taken to a non-union aluminum which is being offered on the market.

Credentials were received at the meeting from T. B. Black, Alex Mc-Rae, F. W. Stamp-Vincent and J. Pottinger, representing the Electrical Workers' Union, and Jack Campbell, F. Rogers, James Simpson and Hugh Armstrong of the Machinists' Union. Records, Victrolas, Orthophonic
