There was an occasional case at places such as Stewart or Terrace but no charge was made in those cases as he had been specially instructed not to do

Mr. Watt said it was difficult to get information when he took over the office as the atmosphere in the department was decidedly frigid and not congenial.

The accounts were audited regularly by the department at which times he discussed financial matters with them but did not remember ever discussing coroner's fees. It had never once been mentioned. C. L Monroe was his successor in office and he had instructed him similarly in regard to the fees. Mr. Monroe was later called and confirmed this and said he had not kept the fees as a discussion regarding its legality arose.


