While the need for development in girls and women of a more fundamental attitude towards expression of freedom through physical culture is great, competitive sports along commercial lines do more harm to girls and women than good, Dr. Jesse F. Williams, professor of physical education at Teacher's College, Columbia University, New York, declared, addressing the members of the Quebec Physical Education Association. Speaking on "The Place of Girls and Women in Competitive Activities," Dr. Williams stressed that girl's sport activities should be fundamentally different from those of men and boys and for this reason he condemned track and field activities for girls and, in their stead, suggested sports where emphasis is laid more on skill than on strength and endurance.


