

VICTORIA, Feb. 20:-Exclusive rights to operate as common carriers in both passenger and freight business on various roads of the province will be granted to competent companies which will pay the government up to one per cent of their gross revenue in return for the privileges, it was disclosed in the legislature yesterday in amendments to the Highway Act introduced by Hon. N. S. Lougheed, minister of public works. The government will create a system of arterial highways in many parts of the province, paying the whole cost of construction and maintenance whether they run through municipalities or not.
