OTTAWA, May 20:-In a statement issued last night, Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King set forth his own attitude and that of his government toward the provinces. The statement came in reply to a declaration by Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Premier of Ontario, from the platform of the Western Ontario Conservative convention at London when Mr. Ferguson was reported as saying that the Ontario government proposed to throw its weight against the federal government forces in the forthcoming general election because of Mr. King'so-
