



NORTH VANCOUVER, Oct. 17:-A Liberal convention last night called to nominate a candidate for the provincial byelection forwarded a resolution to Premier Tolmie asking for immediate construction and completion of the Pacific Great Eastern from North Vancouver to Prince George.

In the event of a favorable reply being received within a week, the Liberals decided not to run a candidate. Failing an official pronouncement, a candidate will be chosen on October 24.
