ROWING AT

Oarsmen From Afar Expected to Compete in Championship Events, August 14 to 16

ST. CATHERINES, Aug. 11:-The forty-eighth annual regatta of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen will open on the Royal Canadian Henley course here on August 14, and continue for the succeeding two days.

This meet for deciding Canadian rowing championships is usually held during the last week in July. but has been set back two weeks because of the British Empire Games which are to be held in Hamilton the week following. The change in dates will permit Canadian crews to compete in the Empire games and giving an opportunity to competitors from outside points in the Empire to enter in the Canadian Henley championship events.

United States clubs are again expected to have entries in the chief events on the card. Last year most of the trophies were brought back to Canada by Canadian clubs.
