Many Industries Will Benefit From Changes Announced by Dunning

British Columbia Producers of Fruit, Vegetables and Grain to Be Protected-Reduction in **Price of Tea Here**

VANCOUVER, May 2:-British Columbia producers of fruit, vegetables, grains, wheat, flour and eggs are protected in the Canadian market from foreign competition by the application of countervailing duties announced by Hon. C. A. Dunning, minister of finance, in presenting his budget at Ottawa yesterday. Exemption of British grown tea from duty will make this commodity available to British Columbia consumers at a retail price reduction of slightly less than seven cents per pound, it is stated here. Mining, lumbering and fishing industries will benefit by the removal or reduction of duty on certain machinery imported into Canada which is not manufactured by the Dominion. The reduced rate on certain tractors will benefit the logging industry.
