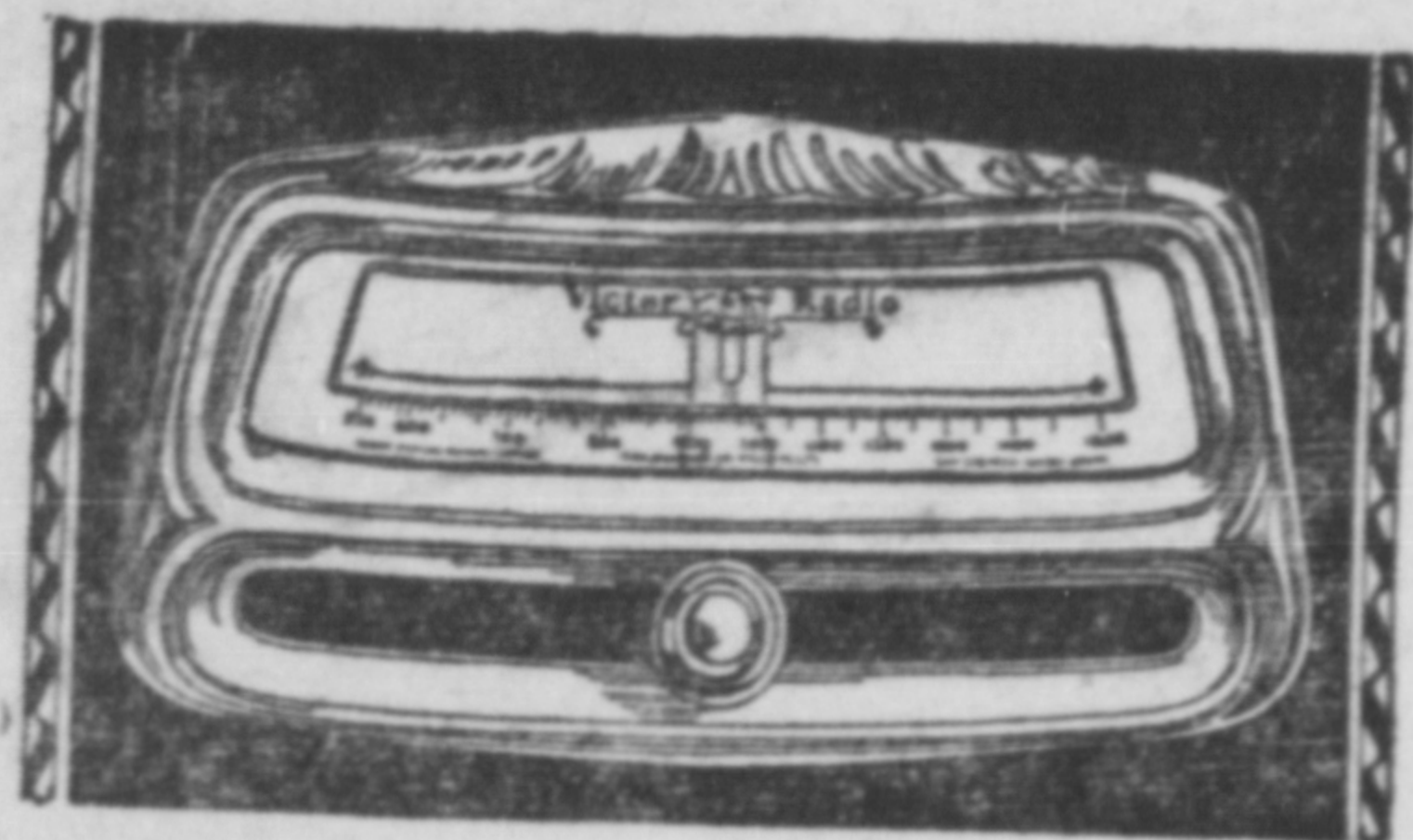
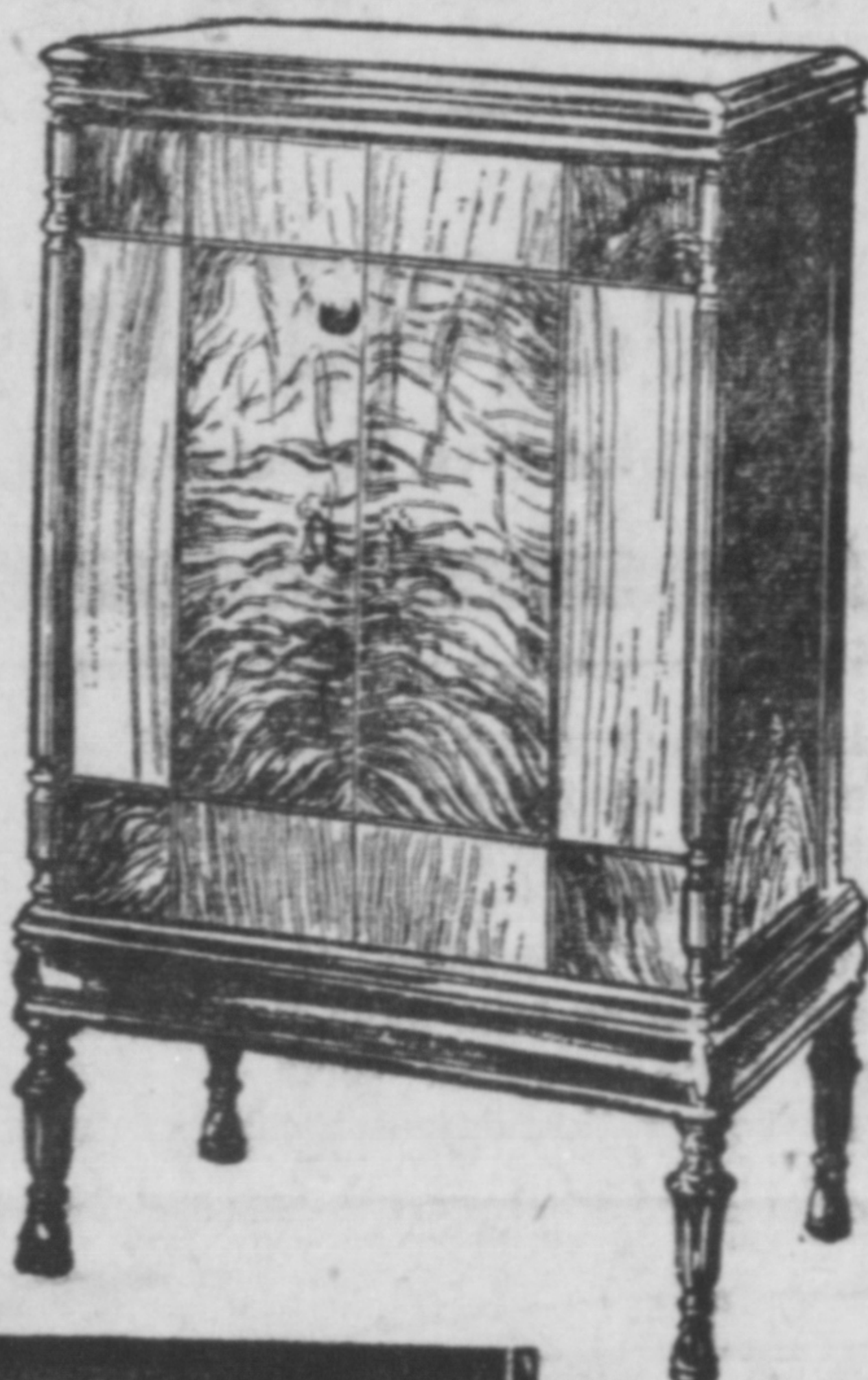

NEW YORK, June 12:—Caught in the fever grip of another heavyweight championship battle, New York fused and spluttered today, predicted and argued, bullied and fought for tickets and waited restlessly for Jack Sharkey's 15-round duel with Max Schmeling in Yankee Stadium tonight. Gross receipts are expected to reach \$750,000. Sharkey, in the betting, remained the favorite at 9 to 5.

"This fight is going to be a cinch," Sharkey stated today. "I never felt better. It won't even be close."

Schmeling stuck to his knitting. He expects to say it with gloves at the proper time.
