

Federal Treasury Has Not Yet Paid Single Dollar to British Columbia on Unemployment Work

OTTAWA, Dec. 23:-The federal treasury has not expended a dollar for unemployment relief in either the city of Vancouver or the province of British Columbia, Senator Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, said today. This was because no certified accounts had been forwarded to Ottawa by the provincial government. Until they were re-

ceived, no money would be paid. Senator Robertson said that British ployment committee of the cabinet, which so far had failed to render its accounts and thus be reimbursed by the federal treasury.
