VISIT OF MINISTERS

On Sunday Prince Rupert had a visit from Hon. D. M. Sutherland, minister of national defence, the first of the members of the Bennett cabinet to come to Prince Rupert. While it was impossible to provide a suitable entertainment owing to the occasion, a quiet dinner was held in recognition of the event and welcomes were extended.

We repeat here what has been said before. The election is over and Premier Bennett is premier of Liberals as well as Conservatives so there should be no difference of opinion about giving the most hearty welcome possible to any members of the Bennett Government. The framers of the constitution never dreamed of the people of the country refusing to support a government once it was elected. If we did this in business when electing a board of directors we should make no headway. So in the government of the country, we must show ourselves big enough to forget the pettiness of political squabbles and back the government that has been elected. Sometimes it may be necessary to criticize their actions but it need not be done in a petty, mean spirit and constant nagging never gets one anywhere.

NEW POST OFFICE

The Daily News has been asked to continue drawing attention to the fact that a new post office is needed in the city. In this case we are not asking for unemployment relief although this will be necessary. What we want is a line Lefter Box post office. We do not want the possibility of another delay of five years.

We never agreed with the Liberal Government in leasing a building for a post office. It was not good policy any more than was the policy of their predecessors. This is a day when governments are erecting their own buildings and particularly their post offices. Both in Canada and United States this is being done and Prince Rupert should not be omitted.

There is a very promising mineral country around the headwaters of the Finlay River, according to William B. George of . Stewart who spent the summer prospecting in that part of the province. Mr. George, well known as the discoverer of the George Copper property the Portland Canal district, went werland from Telegraph Creek to the north of the Finlay River and then came east about 250 miles. There is comparatively little indication of mineral deposits until close to the headwaters of the Finlay, Mr. George says. The mineralized areas offer good chances for prospectors, he declares. There is much local country rich in grass that should prove good for grazing cattle although it does not appear to be suitable for general farming. The country also abounds in moose and caribou.

Ornamental System at Present Planned Criticized By Ald. G. W. Rudderham

Cost Excessive

Plan Finally Accepted With Request That One Block Be Changed

Complaints made by Ald. Rud-

derham as to the plan which had

been followed in laying out standards for ornamental street lighting on Third Avenue resulted in a protracted discussion of nearly two hours at last night's council meeting. Ald. Rudderham's complaint was that too much illumination was being given, particularly on Third Avenue in the block between Sixth and Seventh Streets, and that, while the city did not at present have to pay for the light, it would eventually have to do so and, on the basis set on Third Avenue in the block referred to, it would be more than the city could afford, particularly if extensions of the same intensity should be asked for. The whole new street lighting system was canvassed and the outcome of the discussion was the passing of a motion of Ald. Rudderham, seconded by Ald. Macdonald, that the 50 light plan as now being laid out by the Northern B. C. Power Co. be accepted with the exception that in the block on Third Avenue between Sixth and Seventh Street there be four and three standards on either side of the street instead of five and four as at present arranged for.
